We already have 35 made and donated. Thanks to everyone, and keep adding to that count!

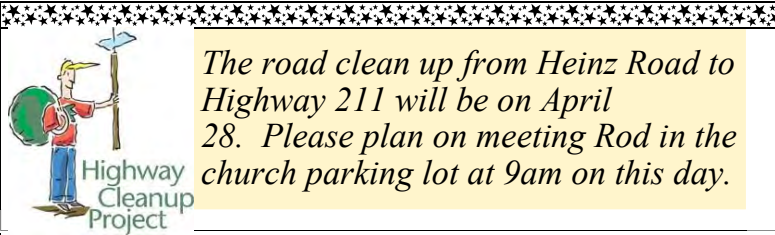
Hats will be collected through the end of April.

DOLLY PARTON'S IMAGINATION LIBRARY.

Children from birth to five years who live in the Canby School District are now eligible to participate in Dolly Parton's Imagination Library program. Each month, every child registered in the program receives a free book in the mail to read and keep.



Here's how it works:

1. A parent or legal guardian submits an official registration form which must be approved and on file with Canby Kiwanis Foundation.
2. Notify Canby Kiwanis foundation any time your address changes as books are mailed to the address on the official registration form.
3. Eight to ten weeks after the registration form has been received, books will begin arriving.

Canby Kiwanis Foundation, with support from the Canby Library Foundation & Canby Public Library, is the Local Champion bringing Dolly Parton's Imagination Library to Canby.

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Lucia Rose Schuebel

March 12, 1915—January 31, 2018



Lucia Rose, the second daughter of Albert F. and Nellie Yoder Eyman, was born on their farm in rural Canby, Oregon, March 12, 1915. She joined her sister, Roberta, and later the family was completed with the births of Anna Lou and Steven. Lucia became part of a large extended family of many uncles and aunts and cousins who lived nearby. Grandparents, Fred & Rosetta Eyman lived just down the road and their home usually filled with relatives every Sunday for dinner and an afternoon of music and play. Her grandfather Jonathan Yoder owned Yoder Mill.

Lucia attended the one-room Rural Dell Grade School and graduated from Molalla Union High School in 1932. Her activities included Glee Club, Class Plays, Home Economics Club, and the Commercial Club. She was a loyal alumna and before her death was the oldest living graduate of the school.

On December 27, 1935, Lucia became the bride of Fred Schuebel at a small wedding in her parent's home. They began married life on a farm in Mulino where she spent the rest of her life. Within several years, Fred & Lucia had two children, Robert in 1940 and Diane in 1943.

After the children were grown, Lucia began working as a cook at Mulino Elementary School. She was able to bring her superb cooking skills to the position, and later became head cook until she retired. Many former students will remember her ability to turn all kinds of food provided by the government's food surplus program into nutritious meals the kids actually liked. She was involved with school cooks organizations on the local level and attended conferences. Her love of Dixieland Jazz helped lure her to a national meeting in New Orleans.

In an earlier time, one might see Lucia bicycling down to meet her friends Blanche Engle & Marge Grief so the they could get some exercise. She did not drive a car until the 1960's, but after she got her license, nothing could stop her. She especially loved her black two-door Ford Fairlane.

Lucia may have needed to be nudged to leave home, but once out the door, she loved traveling. She and Fred drove around the western United States visiting Mt. Rushmore and other sites in the western U. S.. She recalled being behind the wheel as they swooped over the Continental Divide at Monarch Pass in Colorado at over 11,000 feet. Later she cruised the Caribbean and to and around Hawaii. She enjoyed vacationing in the winter in Southern California and was in her element when she could pick lemons off the tree and make lemon pies.

Reading was ingrained into her life at an early age when she and her sisters whiled away the summer lounging on the front porch and reading books. She especially liked Jean Auel & Zane Grey. If she wasn't reading or doing the daily crossword, she would be watching baseball. Her love of the sport went back to the time when Fred played. Later she entered a slogan contest for the Portland Beavers under his name and won. They and others would go to Portland to use the prize of season tickets at the Vaughn Street Park. In later years, she faithfully followed the Seattle Mariners, and was able to go there to see a game.

Lucia was a member of Smyrna United Church of Christ and took part in many church activities. She also belonged to the Mulino Lionesses, the Oak Rebecca Lodge in Molalla, Mulino Grange, and was a 4-H leader. Belonging to any organization was not a casual thing. She took part in every way she could.

As her health declined, she required the assistance of caregivers. Throughout, she never lost her good humor, interest in others and her memory of times past. She always insisted that visitors join her for coffee or tea and cookies.

Lucia slipped away during her afternoon nap on January 31, 2018 at the age of 102. She was predeceased by her husband Fred, and her parents, sisters, brother and daughter-in-law. She is survived by her children and grandchildren, great grandchildren, great-great grandchildren and numerous nieces & nephews. Interment was at Mountain View Cemetery in Oregon City.
