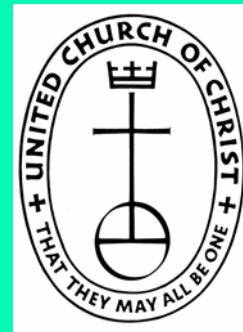

Dear Friends,

Jean Brugger is an amazing woman. She's a nurse who worked most of her life in a variety of roles in St. Louis, and her last job was one of community outreach at Deaconess Hospital there. She started an intentional community for young adults there called the "Diaconal Ministry Program," where people came to share a house and do volunteer work in the community. She also started the Parish Nursing Program at Deaconess, which was honored as an "Innovative Program of the Year" by the Council of Health and Human Service Ministries of the United Church of Christ in 1994. I had the pleasure of meeting her, as I began to work with the parish nurses that same year.

When Jean retired that next year, she took a giant leap of faith. She sold her home, cashed in her retirement savings, and travelled to Nicaragua, where she bought a piece of oceanfront property. But she didn't just build a beautiful retirement home there and sit around. She wanted to help others, so she built a small hotel (with an apartment to live in). People were employed to build the hotel, and then to run the hotel. And then she started raising money for school supplies for kids, and money for older students to go to college. Then she started getting friends to come down and build retirement homes near here, forming a retirement community of people around the hotel. It's kind of like the movie, the "Best Exotic Marigold Hotel" except that she is busy raising money to send kids through college.

Jean's foundation, the A. Jean Brugger Foundation, has put 65 students all the way through college already, and more are there now, and others on their way. 90% of the graduates have jobs, most in their chosen fields. Her story is an inspiration to what we can do, when we follow our hearts, and follow God to love our neighbors as ourselves.

May God bless all the students this fall, all the teachers, and all who help them along the way.

Children for Change in September. . .

. . . will go to support the Fundación A. Jean Brugger (A. Jean Brugger Foundation) in San Juan Del Sur, Nicaragua, which provides university tuition (they have sent 65 students through college to date!), school supplies for public schools, and services to the elderly.

Jean, a colleague of Pastor Deb's in St. Louis, started the parish nurse program at Deaconess Hospital which eventually became the International Parish Nurse Resource Center that Deb headed up for a decade. Shortly after Deb started with the parish nursing program, Jean retired, sold her house, cashed in her retirement funds, and went to Nicaragua to help people there. She ended up building a hotel (for jobs for people), and an independent living retirement community, and she plans to age in place there until she dies.
