
A little bit of this, a little bit of that. Put some in my pocket, wear some in my hat.

Before and After Christmas: Activities and Ideas for Advent and Epiphany by Debbie Trafton O'Neal, illustrated by David LaRochelle.


Christmas Day may have passed, but the season of Christmas continues through Epiphany, January 6. Debbie O'Neal's book offers fun ways to celebrate the history and traditions of the twelve days of Christmas between Christmas and Epiphany.

Intended primarily for families to use as resource for celebrating Advent, Christmas and Epiphany, <u>Before and</u> <u>After Christmas</u> devotes a page or two to daily family time ideas for each day in Advent and through January 6. Each day includes a Bible passage for reading together, a short story on a Christmas tradition, and specific activities, including crafts, recipes, and service projects. David LaRochelle's colorful illustrations are helpful in showing how to do the crafts which can be adapted for all ages. "Gifts to Share" are wonderful ideas for make-ityourself gifts that are inexpensive and thoughtful.

In addition to crafts and activities, <u>Before and After</u> <u>Christmas</u> includes information about seasonal history and traditions that are interesting and entertaining reading, no matter what the season. Debbie O'Neal uses all of these things to inspire ways to create your own traditions for Advent, Christmas and Epiphany and family times throughout the year. It's part of Smyrna UCC's library collection, so check it out!

Papa, Do You Love Me? By Barbara M Joosse illustrated by Barbara Lavallee

"You are my Tender Heart, and I love you." the father responds to the child's question. But of course more questions follow. "How much?" "How long?" and then many, many "What if . . ." questions testing a father's response to various



situations, including the child's failing his duty. "Then, Tender Heart, I would be angry. But still I would love you."

The story is set in Africa but the theme — a child's need to be loved and reassured of love — is universal. The beautiful illustrations warmly highlight the story. This is a great book for a snuggly story time with a special child. It is available in Smyrna's children's book collection which you can find in the classroom next to Pastor Deb's office.

Write a Book Review for the Behold!!

- Is it available in the church, public library, or bookstore?

Notice: The flu season is upon us! There have been 1500 cases of the flu in Oregon so far in 2019 vs. 400 in 2018. IT IS NOT TOO LATE TO GET YOUR FLU SHOT!

Flu Season tips

How can you avoid spreading the flu to others?

Flu typically spreads when a sick person's mucous finds its way into a healthy person's body. This usually happens when people with the flu sneeze or cough, which sprays droplets of virus-containing mucous into the air where it can be inhaled or otherwise taken up by innocent bystanders. A new study even shows that breathing alone is enough to spread the flu virus. Stay at home if you are sick.

Flu can also spread when a sick person touches a railing, doorknob, or other objects that people will be handling. Washing your hands often — especially if you've been sneezing, coughing, or wiping your nose — this will reduce the number of flu-ridden germs you leave behind.

IF YOU HAVE THE FLU, YOU'RE MOST CONTA-GIOUS DURING THE FIRST THREE OR FOUR DAYS. BUT YOU CAN STILL SPREAD THE FLU FOR UP TO SEVEN DAYS. YOU CAN ALSO GIVE OTHER PEOPLE THE FLU BEFORE YOUR SYMP-TOMS SHOW UP. THIS IS WHY EXPERTS SAY, OVER AND OVER AGAIN THAT FLU SHOTS ARE THE BEST WAY TO PREVENT WIDESPREAD OUTBREAKS.

Can you get the flu twice in one season?

Unfortunately, yes. There are often several different flu strains circulating at the same time each year, and you can certainly get one after another. If you spend a lot of time in places where a lot of people intermingle, you're more likely to be exposed to different strains of the flu, and so more likely to contract an influenza infection more than once. The one bright spot; if the two strains of flu that you contract are closely related, your symptoms the second time around should be milder.

Is it ever too late in the season to get the flu shot?

No. You would like to be vaccinated before the season starts.... the CDC says people should consider getting a flu shot as long as flu season persists, which in some years could run into May. If you can get your flu shot before the end of October, that's usually ideal.

Why do some people feel flu-ish after they get the shot?


In rare cases, most involving kids, the inactive virus proteins in the flu vaccine can trigger a low-grade fever or other mild flu-like symptoms such as headaches. These symptoms tend to last for a day or two, which is much shorter than a full-fledged influenza infection.


More commonly, someone who has already contracted the flu or a common cold- but who hasn't yet begun to feel symptoms —

mistakenly blames the vaccine when their symptoms emerge. Tens of millions of Americans will develop colds or flu each year, and tens of millions will get the flu vaccine. It's a statistical certainty that many, many people are going to develop cold or flu symptoms around the time they get the flu shot.

What are the chances that you'll get the flu even if you get a flu shot (and how is that possible in the first place?)

That's impossible to say for certain because the flu shot's effectiveness varies from year to year. But experts say that, even in the best years, the flu vaccine is only 50%-70% effective. There are hundreds of different flu strains, and any number of them may be circulating during a given flu season. While the experts sometimes guess wrong, there's evidence that symptoms of flu tend to be milder among people who are vaccinated, compared to those who are not, even when the vaccine isn't optimally matched to that year's strain.
