Dear Friends,

Florence Nightingale is known as the founder of modern-day nursing, the "Lady with the Lamp" who tended the soldiers in the Crimean War. Her nursing work, though, was only the tip of the iceberg. She organized many social programs for the soldiers – such as a banking system where they could save their money to use when they returned home, or send to their families left back in England. She set up a café where men could socialize and write letters rather than just spend their money at local bars. She helped the men communicate with their families back home and helped locate needed supplies for them by asking her well-to-do friends and neighbors in England for help. (She also wrote a Greek grammar, that was used as a textbook at Oxford, did statistical analysis on public health for the British Army in India, wrote theological essays and sermons, and more....)

Smyrna tends to have a similar outlook to Florence's. If there is something that needs to be done, there are folks at Smyrna who find a way to do it – to contribute to the welfare of others. Sometimes that is far away, like the support we are providing to the young girls and women in Kenya through "Quilts for Empowerment" or the "Tools and Seeds" through Heifer Project, or the "PlumpyNut" infant nutrition program of UNICEF.

Sometimes there is a need right at home – food pantries, Habitat for Humanity houses, neighbors who could use a friendly visitor. This Lent, we are going to be hearing from visitors from neighboring towns where we have members. Stay tuned for more!

What a gift, to live in a world where we have an opportunity to share and to be blessed in our sharing. Thanks be to God for Smyrna and its people.

Camp To Belong

The Children For Change Offering during March and April will go to help support Camp To Belong.

Camp To Belong is an international camp program founded by Lynn Price in 1994. After discovering that she was in foster care and had a sister at the age of 8, Price founded Camp To Belong to provide separated siblings with opportunities to make memories together that she did not have. With member camps all over the United States and Australia, Camp To Belong camps have served nearly 13,000 separated siblings.

Since bringing Camp To Belong to the Northwest in 2006, nearly 2,000 youth have been served. Now serving primarily Oregon youth, two sessions of Camp To Belong are held each summer. Camp To Belong is a one-week long residential camp experience designed specifically to provide siblings with opportunities to make positive, childhood memories together, despite living separated. Activities at camp include an all camp birthday party, carnival night, sibling scrapbooks, campfires, arts and crafts, swimming, boating, rock climbing, archery, and so much more.

Camp To Belong has proven to be a powerful intervention for siblings living separately. In 2017, 97% of campers reported making positive memories with their siblings at camp and 85% reported that attending camp made their sibling relationship stronger. Beyond that, 92% reported that their time at camp made them more hopeful about their futures.

On Friday, March 6th, we will welcome Dr. Sadja Greenwood, a pioneer in women's health in Berke-




ley during the 1960's, who will talk with us about how she got into the field, what she did in her work and how she stays active today.

Coronavirus - there are more useful things to do than worry.....

News of coronovirus infections is causing many people to panic. There are absolutely things we can do to protect us from infection by this novel respiratory virus. Some involve a societal response, but others are very simple.

Most important, wash your hands. Wash them often. Wash them for at least 20 seconds with soap and water. Wash them especially well if you're about to eat. Wash them after you've blown your nose, coughed or sneezed. Make it routine that all members of the household wash their hands when they get home.

I know it can be hard to do this yourself, let alone get others to do it. So make it a game, offer incentives. Almost nothing that you, or your family, can do will protect you more from infections than washing your hands.

Here are five steps:

- 1) Wet your hands
- 2) Lather them, and then
- 3) Scrub them for at least 20 seconds. No one ever looks at a clock, so try singing the "Happy Birthday" song twice, from start to finish. I know 20 seconds seems like a long time, however, research does exist to say that shorter times aren't as good at removing germs, and much longer times can actually damage the skin and can be counterproductive.
- 4) Rinse
- 5) Dry

If you can't wash your hands, then hand sanitizer with at least 60% alcohol will work, but it's not as good. If using sanitizer, rub your hands together hitting all spaces (between fingers ,etc,) until dry

Don't touch your face in general, especially with unwashed hands. Don't shake hands with people who are sick. If you're sick, stay away from other people. Clean the objects and surfaces that you touch a lot.

What's not recommended for everyone? **Face masks.** If you're sick they may help prevent you from spreading the virus, but they don't do as much to help keep healthy people from getting sick.

It too soon to know how widespread and deadly the Coronavirus will be, but to date there have been 1,300 deaths from it in China. However, this flu season, there have already been 10,000 deaths from the flu in the U.S. Every year physicians and public health officials try to get you to immunize yourselves against the flu, and far too many don't. We beg you to practice proper precautions and hygiene, and, still, tens of thousands of people die, and too few worry enough. Should you be worried about getting infected with viruses? Sure. Have you gotten a flu shot yet?

Channel your fears into productive behaviors. That's how you'll significantly reduce your risk from being infected with 2019-mCoV. It'll also help you from being infected with the flu. It'll even help protect you from getting a cold. Wins all around.


"Yes," St Peter replied, "that's true. But during your sermons people slept. When the Taxi Driver drove, everyone prayed."

News on the Pews



About three weeks ago, a group of gung ho members gathered to begin the process of taking the 40+ year old upholstery off of the 129 year old pews. It was quickly determined, that the folks who put that upholstery on the pews ... intended for it to STAY on there for a very long time! Many staples held the fabric fast to the wood.

> It took eight hours of many hands, nail pullers, screw drivers, hammers, and pliers . . to fill the 11 large trash bags with the dusty foam and fabric.

The Council approved having a professional antique repairman take a few pews at a time to his shop and spiff them up with stain and repairs as needed. This could take up to six weeks to complete.

The new cushions will not be tacked

down, but instead sit on foam to hold them in place. We tested samples of the cushions since Christmas, on a few pews. The color was picked to compliment the new carpeting we had installed last year.
