Dear Smyrna Friends,

Do you remember what you were doing on the first day of the new millennium, January 1, 2000? I remember that it was a rather mild day in St. Louis that New Year's Day, and we went outside for awhile to play in the back yard with John and Sophia, who were 3 and 4 at the time. I distinctly remember one particular moment of us with them on a play structure, thinking that the years ahead would go quickly. And they have. Time passes so quickly.

The same is true for the time I have spent at Smyrna. During this time, many of the young people who were in Confirmation classes have graduated from high school and are in college. New babies were born. More than two dozen people died, and nearly three dozen people joined the church. We have been together for worship, for Women's Fellowship Luncheons, for Memory Café, and Coffee and Friends, and Adult Education. The eight years since the fall of 2013 when I started at Smyrna have flown by.

I shall miss you, far more than you will ever know. I shall hold you in prayer and in my heart. And I shall rejoice with you and for you when you call a new settled pastor to serve with you as part of the wonderful community of faith that Smyrna is. In the meantime, you will be in good hands with an interim pastor who is prepared to lead in the coming months until the next search and call process (or "search and rescue" as I have heard it called) is completed.

Journeys of faith always include transitions. They also include searching, and transitions, and blessings. Whether gathered or scattered, the church continues on the journey of following Christ, and that we will always be doing together. Thank you for the opportunity to serve as your pastor these last eight years.

If you shop online using Amazon, be sure to use Smile. Amazon.com. You can sign in with your Amazon password. If you have not chosen a charity, you will be asked to do so. If you want to support Smyrna, enter the full name Smyrna United Church of Christ. You can support any other charity that has registered.

When you submit your order, it will tell you how many times you have supported the church and how much the church received. <u>Just Mercy</u> by Bryan Stevenson. Spiegel & Grau, 2014.

Bryan Stevenson writes about his uphill efforts as a young lawyer to help Walter McMillian. Mr. McMillian has been sentenced to die for a notorious murder he didn't . This book is a "page-turner" and reminiscent of John



Grisham's legal thrillers. Seeking justice for the wrongly accused has become Stevenson's life work and led to his founding of The Equal Justice Initiative (www.eji.org). <u>Just Mercy</u> is a compelling argument for "the redeeming potential of mercy", especially for "people trapped in the furthest reaches of our criminal justice system."

Preparing for a Power Outage

During last winter's ice storm and power outage, I discovered that I was ill prepared for an outage lasting more than a few hours. I had no heat, no generator, no non-electric stove, and no internet service. I had a cordless phone which went dead relatively quickly. I had a cell phone with no non-electric means of charging it. I had cell phone numbers for relatives but not neighbors, and the ice-covered sidewalks made it hazardous to walk to a neighbor's house to check on them.

I also discovered that my community was ill prepared for a prolonged power outage. There were no warming centers (the inverse of cooling centers in heat waves). There were no community kitchens serving hot food for those who needed it, or at least there was no way of finding them (if they existed) without internet service. There were no generators in some retirement communities, or in some cases there were generators which were inadequate to heat the entire facility. There were no trucks clearing ice off the streets. There were workers clearing downed trees and downed power lines, but it took days and sometimes weeks to restore power to all affected residents.

Some of my neighbors went to stay with relatives living nearby



who had power or generators. Some had relatives who tried and failed to reach them due to impassable roads. Some

had propane grills and were able to have hot food and water. A few had generators. Most of us huddled under the heaviest blankets we could find, dressed in the warmest clothes we could find, and ate cold food out of the refrigerator or the cupboards. In my community, the power came back on before the temperature reached freezing level inside our houses. In other places the outage went on for about two weeks, long enough to prove deadly for anyone who was unable to leave or unprepared for emergency survival.

In the event of another winter power outage, all of us would be wise to be better prepared in advance. There are many sources

of information about emergency preparedness, including but not limited to the American Red Cross and FEMA. There are places to buy pre-assemble emergency kits (the Red Cross or Amazon, for instance) or individual survival items to fit your own needs.


Suggestions for supplies for a basic power outage survival kit vary, but some common items include the following:

- emergency water pouches or bottles
- high-calorie food bars or other non-perishable food that is easy to prepare
- manual can openers
- body warmers, emergency blankets, and/or sleeping bags
- rain ponchos
- tube tents
- flashlights, extra batteries, headlamps, and/or lanterns
- whistle
- emergency supply of prescription medication and OTC medication you may need
- emergency supply of cash
- moist towelettes, garbage bags, and plastic ties for personal sanitation
- a plastic tub or backpack to keep these things together

For a longer term power outage, you may include the following:

- power banks, car chargers, or solar chargers for phones and other devices
- outdoor grill or camp stove
- two-week supply of food and water
- important personal documents
- coolers to store food from your refrigerator and refrigerator
- water purification tablets or filters
- Yaktrax (traction devices to fit on your shoes to walk more safely on icy streets)

Perhaps a good idea would be to form a neighborhood group similar to the neighborhood watch, but focused on community emergencies rather than crime. If neighbors know each other, and know what they all have to offer in time of need, they can pool their resources and help each other survive a disaster of whatever kind.



Preparedness tip of the month — CAR

Always try to maintain at least ½ a tank of gas in case emergency strikes.

Things to keep in your trunk: Flares, flashlight, space blankets, Small fire extinguisher, water (in a metal thermos) don't forget to freshen routinely, some sort of food – sealed trail mix packs, etc (Pastor Deb recommends chocolate!)
