Pastoral Search Committee Update

The Pastoral Search Committee has recommended, and Church Council has approved, two ministers to share our Intentional Interim transition pastoral position, beginning March 1.

Rev. Catherine Allard, "Cat," is a graduate of University of New Hampshire, Durham, and Andover Newton Theological School, Newton Centre MA. She was ordained a UCC minister in 2016, and has served in multiple roles and several states, most recently here at Smyrna UCC and prior to that at Meridian UCC in Wilsonville. She is a member of Christ the Healer UCC Church in Oregon City and lives in Wilsonville. Rev. Catherine will serve half-time and lead the primary pastoral roles of preaching and worship leadership, pastoral care, staff oversight, Christian education, and working with Council and key committees except for committees related to the interim transition process.

Rev. Dr. Janet Parker is a graduate of Furman University, Greenville, SC, Princeton Theological Seminary, and Union Theological Seminary. She was ordained in the Presbyterian Church (USA) in 1989, and transferred to the UCC in 2005. She has served in multiple roles, many states, and overseas in Taiwan. She is a certified Intentional Interim minister, and so she brings the transition skills Smyrna had sought. Most recently, she served as Interim Pastor at First Congregational UCC in Portland, and prior to that at St. James Lutheran Church in Portland. She is in the process of transferring her membership to Lake Oswego UCC. She lives in Beaverton with her wife, Rev. Robyn Hartwig. Rev. Janet will serve quarter-time and lead in matters relating to the process work of the interim period. In support of this transition work, she will preach roughly once per month.

We are pleased to welcome back Pastor Cat, and extend a new welcome to Pastor Janet. The shared effort is an innovative approach to this kind of transition ministry, and we are looking forward to working with both of them.

Dress for Survival

We have probably all seen pictures of people fleeing a wildfire, flames licking at their doorsteps or at the doors of their vehicle. Here is a tip for anyone who may face that possibility. Get dressed for survival. Wear personal protective clothing which will protect you from heat, embers, and flames:

- ⇒ Long pants
- ⇒ Sturdy boots and wool socks
- \Rightarrow Floppy hat
- ⇒ Bandana
- ⇒ Goggles
- ⇒ Leather gloves
- ⇒ N95 mask to filter out particulates
- ⇒ Collared long-sleeve shirt

The best choices are 100% natural fabrics such as heavy denim or pure wool. Do not wear any synthetic clothing. It may burst into flame or melt, causing severe burns to anyone wearing it. Once you are in a safe place, you can go back to your fleece jacket, etc., if you want

Good Advice, For People Over 60! By Arnaldo Liechtenstein, Physician

Whenever I teach clinical medicine to students in the fourth year of medicine, I ask the following question:

What are the causes of mental confusion in the elderly?

Some offer: "Tumors in the head." I answer: No!

Others suggest: "Early symptoms of Alzheimer's." I answer again: No!

With each rejection of their answers, their responses dry up.

And they are even more open-mouthed when I list the three most common causes:

- uncontrolled diabetes
- urinary infection
- dehydration

It may sound like a joke, but it isn't.

People over 60 generally stop feeling thirsty and consequently stop drinking fluids. When no one is around to remind them to drink fluids, they quickly dehydrate. Dehydration is severe and affects the entire body It may cause abrupt mental confusion, a drop in blood pressure, increased heart palpitations, angina (chest pain), coma and even death.

This habit of forgetting to drink fluids begins at age 60, when we have just over 50% of the water we should have in our bodies. People over 60 have a lower water reserve. This is part of the natural aging process.

But there are more complications. Although they are dehydrated, they don't feel like drinking water, because their internal balance mechanisms don't work very well.

Conclusion:

People over 60 years old dehydrate easily, not only because they have a smaller water supply, but also because they do not feel the lack of water in the body.

Although people over 60 may look healthy, the performance of reactions and chemical functions can damage their entire body.

So here are two alerts:

- 1. *Get into the habit of drinking liquids*. Liquids include water, juices, teas, coconut water, milk, soups, and water-rich fruits, such as watermelon, melon, peaches and pineapple; orange and tangerine also work.
 - *The important thing is that, every two hours, you must drink some liquid. Remember this!*
- → Alert for family members: constantly offer fluids to people over 60. At the same time, observe them
- 2. If you realize that they are rejecting liquids and, from one day to the next, they are irritable, breathless or display a lack of attention, these are almost certainly recurrent symptoms of dehydration.

Embodying the Way of the Prince of Peace Lenten Series

We have a rare privilege during Lent to walk with some outstanding human beings who embody the Way of the Prince of Peace in the Holy Land. Come meet Robi Damelin and Bassam Aramin, an Israel Jew and a Palestinian Muslim, both of whom lost children to this conflict. They work constantly for reconciliation and peace across the Wall through the Parents Circle. Listen to Daoud Nassar, owner of Tent of Nations farm, tell his family's story of peacemaking. He wasbeaten, and lives constantly under threat to give up his land to the Israeli settlers, or the state of Israel. Regardless of those constant threats, Daoud teaches nonviolence on his farm and practices peacemaking. Pilgrims of Ibillin trip leaders willtheir vision for spiritual journeys they lead to the Holy Land. Joined by pilgrims who have traveled there, we will hear how their lives have been changed forever after meeting outstanding peacemakers and walking where Jesus walked. Finally, we will join together for a meditation of prayers, photos and readings on what we have experienced walking together through Lent in this Holy Land peacemaker series.

Parents Circle Peace Witnesses Robi Damelin and Bassam Aramin

March 12 - 10:00 a.m. Pacific/11:00a.m. Mountain/12 Central/1:00 Eastern

Robi Damelin, an Israeli Jew, and Bassam Aramin, a Palestinian Muslim, share the unthinkable loss of their children to this conflict. They have forged an unbreakable friendship through the Parents Circle, a group of those who have this grief in common. They team up to comfort and bring hope to others who lose family to this continued conflict. Parents Circle members go into the schools to humanize those whom students see as the 'Other' and sponsor thousands of phone lines to stay in touch across the Wall. They go behind the Wall to meet with those with new losses.

Come meet these incredible peacemakers and hear how they work for reconciliation in Palestine/Israel. Let them inspire you with their stories.

Daoud Nassar of Tent of Nations

March 19 - 10:00 a.m. Pacific/11:00a.m. Mountain/12 Central/1:00 Eastern

"Come in. Come in," says Palestinian Christian Daoud Nassar to Israeli settlers trespassing on his property, threatening him with guns. "Please lay down your weapons, take off your shoes, and come into my cave for tea." Some settlers do come in and leave changed by their peacemaking neighbor. Others have burned and bulldozed his olive tree orchards. Forbidden to build a home, a well, or even a shed for his animals on his land, he watches four illegal settlements spread over the hills around his property. The farm has been in the family for generations. It is often under attack and intense threat of seizure by the Israeli government. Daoud's response is nonviolence, teaching children his gentle way at a summer camp on his land, inviting internationals to come plant olive trees, and to continually fight in court to keep his land and orchards. Come hear this remarkable man's story who embodies the path of the Prince of Peace.

Come and See. Go and Tell.

The third segment of CPC PIN Network's Lenten Series is entitled "Come and See, Go and Tell" and incorporates the powerful stories of those who have traveled to the Holy Land and experienced walking in the footsteps of Jesus, the Prince of Peace. The Pilgrims of Ibillin have been making those pilgrimages possible for many years and are our partners in creating this segment and its messages.

Many visitors to Palestine hear these New Testament words of Jesus (John 1:39-41) from Christian Palestinians they meet. Those who travel to the Holy Land and spend time meeting Palestinians find both Christian and Muslim folks eager to share their lives, tell their stories, and hear our stories in return.

Very few who travel to Palestine on a pilgrimage or witness trip come home unchanged. In addition to powerful spiritual experiences, we remember the people we have met. We find we cannot forget the difficult, unjust conditions under which the people we have come to know by name live their lives.

Most transformative is that, by the time we return home, we have met true peacemakers. In time we discover that we, ourselves, are called to act as peacemakers as well.

The Pilgrims of Ibillin has brought Americans and many others to Palestine-Israel to support the work of Archbishop Elias Chacour (BLOOD BROTHERS, WE BELONG TO THE LAND) and the Mar Elias Educational Institutions which he founded. Additionally, visitors meet peacemakers both in Israel and the West Bank. Trip leaders will share their vision and witness to those journeys and pilgrimages in the Holy Land ... and they will be joined by pilgrims who have returned home to become the makers of peace.
