GATHERING WITH FRIENDS AND FAMILY

- Many gatherings are a time of fellowship and celebration. With vaccinations and boosters now readily available, the risk of infection is different for everyone. If you and the people you gather with are up-to-date with COVID-19 vaccines and boosters, your risks will be lower. But some vaccinated people still get sick with COVID-19 or can spread it to others. So here are some ways to stay safe during gatherings no matter the occasion.
- Get vaccinated and stay up-to-date with a booster when you are eligible to protect yourself and those around you
- It's OK to ask if others are vaccinated before getting together with people you don't live with. You can choose to stay home or find other ways to connect if you feel nervous.
- Masks are no longer required in most public settings, but they are still effective at reducing the spread of COVID-19.
- It is recommended you continue to wear a mask and stay 6 feet from others when gathering if you:
 - \Rightarrow Are not vaccinated
 - \Rightarrow Are over age 65
 - \Rightarrow Have a weakened immune system
 - \Rightarrow Have an underlying medical condition that puts you at higher risk of serious illness from COVI-19
- \Rightarrow Live with someone in one of these categories.
- Avoid poorly ventilated spaces, especially when in a crowd.
- Keep the air flowing by opening windows or running a fan or air purifier if possible
- Get tested if you have symptoms of COVID-19 or have been in close contact with someone who has COVID-19
- Stay home if you're feeling sick or unwell, and don't host any gatherings.
- Wash your hands often
- Take extra care if you have an underlying medical condition that puts you at higher risk of serious illness from COVID-19 or if you take medications that weaken your immune system.
- It is recommended that you continue to wear a mask that fits snugly over your nose and mouth whenever you're around people even if you're fully vaccinated and have had a booster

We hope you'll stay safe and healthy during gatherings all year long. Find vaccine and boosters by calling 211, visiting your local pharmacy or doctor's office, or using GetVaccinatedOregon.gov.

<u>Voices from the Pandemic</u>, by Eli Saslow, is a book well worth reading. Saslow is a journalist who interviewed hundreds of people affected by the COVID pandemic in various ways. People who lost a loved one to the pandemic and were unable even to visit them in the hospital before they died; people who inadvertently passed on COVID to their family, some of whom then died; paramedics who picked up COVID patients, most of whom died in the early days of the pandemic, people who lost their jobs and were unable to pay their rent and in some cases were evicted, landlords who lost rent income and were thus unable to pay their own mortgages, COVID deniers, retail workers who had to deal with COVID deniers who aggressively refused to wear masks, and many other stories, Read it to get a more complete picture of the societal impact of the current pandemic, as told by the people who lived the stories

In other words December 26-January 6. Read the Artist's Note in the beautifully illustrated "The Twelve Days of Christmas" by Laurel Long for some fascinating background on the song.



The questions surrounding the history and symbolism of "The Twelve Days of Christmas" open it up to a variety of interpretations. The Library Committee is offering "Twelve days of Kindness" ideas starting the day after Christmas Day and running through Epiphany, January 6th.
