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

Library News

Three books by Fr. Gregory Boyle, founder of Homeboy Industries the largest gang-intervention and rehabilitation and reentry program in the world, have been donated to the library:

Tattoos on the Heart: The Power of Boundless Compassion, Free Press, 2010.

Barking To The Choir: The Power of Radical Kinship, Simon & Schuster, 2017.

The Whole Language: The Power of Extravagant Tenderness, Avid Reader Press, 2021.

These inspirational books are soaked in grace, humility, grit and humor—not just the author's but also of the gang members he serves. Writer Elizabeth Gilbert says of *Barking To The Choir*, but it applies to all 3 books, "A beautiful and important and soultransporting book.... This book is about how to love people. How to *really* love people. And how to know God when you see God."

In May of this year, Fr. Boyle received the Presidential Medal of Freedom. After receiving the award, Fr. Boyle expressed what the honor meant to him: "For me, it represents standing at the margins so that the margins erase and especially representing thousands and thousands of men and women who've walked through our doors wanting to reimagine their lives." Inspiration, hope, reimagining the impossible and great story-telling make the three books great reads.

Driving After Dark

Perhaps you've noticed that many senior citizens don't like driving after dark, because night vision decreases with age. One reason is the loss of rod and cone receptors within the eye, which decreases the amount of light that reaches the retina. Another reason is that our pupils (which regulate how much light enters our eyes) shrink with age. By the time we reach our 60s, the backs of our eyes receive only about a third of the light they did when we were about 20.

Yet another reason is that we also become less sensitive to changes in contrast and thus are less able to see pedestrians and road signs along the way. In addition, there is the matter of cataracts, which affect virtually everyone who lives long enough. More than half of people over 80 have cataracts (which, of course, can be corrected by surgery after the surgeon believes they are bad enough to warrant it).

Automobile headlights are in some cases worsening the problem, with the prevalence of SUVs and their headlights being mounted higher than the smaller cars they are meeting on the road, so that the lights may shine directly into the eyes of the drivers of the smaller cars. And recovery from glare also takes longer for the older driver. A new technology on the horizon may be of help.

Other parts of the world have been using adaptive driving beam headlights, which use a camera that helps direct LED bulbs away from oncoming cars and still light up your side of the road and give you an extra 165 or more feet of visibility.

Until the adaptive beam headlights become common in the U.S., here are some things you may do to help yourself out.

- 1. Drive at night as little as possible.
- 2. If you do need to drive after dark, use your bright lights as much as possible (while remembering to dim them when meeting or passing other cars).
- 3. When you buy a new car, look for a model with top-rated headlights. There is, of course, a website for this (go to iihs.org/ratings to find a car's safety rating).
- 4. If your car is several years old, think about getting your headlights and casings replaced. A study by AAA found that in some cases old headlights and casings were putting out only 22 percent of the light that new ones would provide.
- 5. Keep your windshield and headlights cleaned.
- 6. Adjust the illumination levels of your dashboard lights to low; bright light inside makes it harder to see outside.
- 7. When you are out at night, skip the cocktails and drink coffee to avoid drowsiness.

JOHN NILSEN

John Nilsen was born in Seattle, Washington in 1956. The Nilsen family moved to Portland, Oregon, USA in 1960. Nilsen began studying classical piano from his mother at age six. Continuing his musical education, he began playing guitar at age fourteen. John moved to Ashland, Oregon in 1974 to attend Southern Oregon College (Southern Oregon University), graduating in 1979 with a Bachelor of Arts in English. He was honored by the institution in 1995 with the Distinguished Alumnus Award in recognition of his outstanding achievements, dedicated efforts and leadership in the field of the performing arts. An accomplished pianist, guitarist, composer, lyricist and vocalist, Nilsen was also selected to be a Yamaha Signature Piano Artist in November, 2021.

Nilsen was inducted into the Oregon Music Hall of Fame Oct. 12, 2024. Nilsen founded the Magic Wing recording label.in 1987. The label has a catalog of nineteen successful titles, each with international distribution. Before founding Magic Wing, John recorded three successful solo piano records on LA's, Eagle Records from 1983 to 1985. He has had fifteen other CDs licensed in countries including Germany, Great Britain, The Philippines, Canada, Taiwan and Singapore bringing reported total record sales to well over one million copies sold

John Nilsen has two hundred and fifty of his compositions and musical arrangements receiving airplay royalties world wide. *Foreign Films* was released August 23, 2019 and em-

phasizes Nilsen's superb piano compositions with orchestral backing. The newest Nilsen release is titled, Two Stories.

Released in Dec. 2022, Two Stories is with Nilsen's band, SWIMFISH, and not be missed. A forthcoming album with SWIMFISH is currently being recorded. Nilsen has performed in all fifty U.S. States and on four continents. Nilsen splits his performances between touring internationally as an in demand pianist combining elements of classical, folk and jazz, performing with the John Nilsen Trio, featuring Jeff Leonard/bass and Jason Moore/percussion, and with John's guitar/vocal rock band, John Nilsen & SWIMFISH, featuring Dave Captein/ bass, Mike Snyder/drums, percussion, Bob Logue/ guitar, vocals and Don Woodward/guitar, mandolin, harmonica, vocals. SWIMFISH includes John's piano, but features his acoustic and electric guitar work tucked into a bed of a uniquely great supporting cast. Nilsen was been a member of Ten Grands since its inception in 2001 and through 2022. He has given back to his community by teaching songwriting residencies and speaking to students in schools throughout the country, and locally including every school in the West Linn/Wilsonville School District over the past twenty-five years.

The Bach Cantata Choir presents its annual Baroque Holiday Concert at 7:30pm at Rose City Park Presbyterian Church, 1907 NE 45th St. in Portland Oregon. The concert features J. S. Bach's Christmas Oratorio (parts 1, 2, 5 and 6). Ralph Nelson conducts the 45-voice choir and 15-piece chamber orchestra.

Rose City Park Presbyterian is located in the Hollywood District at the corner of NE 44th St. and NE Sandy Boulevard. The church has an elevator from the parking lot to assist patrons who need handicapped access. All tickets are \$35 general admission seating. Students may purchase \$10 at the door on the night of the concert.

J. S. Bach wrote his famous Christmas Oratorio in 1733 in Leipzig, Germany. Parts 1-2 tell the Christmas Story from the Gospel of Luke. Parts 5-6 tell the Christmas Story from the Gospel of Matthew. The performance will be sung in German. Extensive translations are found in the program book. As part of the concert, the audience will be invited to sing three

chorales (hymns) that Bach wrote as part of the Christmas Oratorio.

Virginia Wilson Yoder October 10, 1927-November 4, 2024

Virginia Rosemary (Wilson) Yoder was born in her grandmother's kitchen in Barlow, Oregon on October 10, 1927. She was the eldest of seven and spent her early years in Siletz, Oregon. Following her freshman year of high school, to pursue an interest in Chemistry, Virginia moved in with

her aunt and uncle in Yoder to attend Molalla Union High School. After Virginia graduated from M.U.H.S. in 1945, she attended one year at Oregon State University, briefly worked in Portland, and then returned to Yoder, marrying Emerson Yoder in September 1946.

As a young mother, Virginia had her hands full caring for 6 children, expansive gardens, orchards and various animals. She preserved all varieties of harvests to use and share throughout the year. Virginia also wrote columns for the Molalla Pioneer and Canby Herald, filled with news of family and friends' adventures. She later taught Kindergarten and 4-H,




volunteered at Rural Dell Elementary, was a lifetime FCE member, a Master Preserver and an exceptionally active member of Smyrna U.C.C., including the Stitch Club, choir and Women's Fellowship groups.

Virginia enjoyed people. She corresponded with friends and family all around the world and was able to visit many in person. She opened her home to numerous exchange students, several of whom became beloved members of the family. She had a deep, sincere interest in what could be learned from others, their cultures and their life experiences. Virginia was a gracious host, invited people without local family to join hers for special events and holidays, threw memorable birthday parties, had countless overnights and visits with grandchildren and great-grandchildren, hosted students for school outings and made each and every person who entered her home feel valued and welcomed.

Virginia loved to learn. She was a skilled baker, cook, gardener and seamstress who created beauty in the practical: intricately embroidered dish towels and pillowcases, that special finishing touch on a salad or dessert, colorful flowers alongside her vegetable garden. She loved to travel and packed delicious homemade picnic lunches and creative care packages to keep the children entertained. She was interested in history and genealogy. She was an avid reader and book club member. She sought out new experiences through trips, food, theater, art classes or simply good conversation. She approached life with a curiosity that helped her find joy in all things. She always chose to focus on the positive.

Virginia lived a life of generosity and love in action. She made room at her table for anyone, ensuring all were well-fed and inevitably sent home with a little something for later. She showed how much richer life becomes when you add another plate, move a little closer together and open your heart to share with whomever may show up at your door.
