Dear Smyrna Folks,

I'm writing this on January 23 (with apologies to Jeannie, because that means I'm three days late!). A lot has changed already in the past week, and we don't know what will change between now and the time you read this. But, I am pretty sure one reality will remain unchanged: Immigrants to our country will still need our understanding, advocacy and compassion. I asked our conference minister Tyler Connoley how he recommends churches live into their care for immigrants. He suggested exploring the process of becoming Immigrant Welcoming. Similar to our designation of Open and Affirming, which affirms our care and unconditional welcome of members of the LGBGTQ+ community, Immigrant Welcoming is a symbol of our open doors and understanding of an all-embracing God.

According to the national UCC Immigrant Welcoming movement: "We live in a world of people on the move. According to the United Nations, there are over 100 million forcibly displaced people in the world – an unfortunate record in world history. The Bible is full of stories about God's people being forced to leave their countries: Adam and Eve, Noah, Sarah and Abraham, Joseph, Moses, Naomi, Esther, Jeremiah, Jesus, Mary and Joseph to name some. We in the United Church of Christ find our grounding in God's Word about how we are to treat the stranger in our midst. We believe we are called to offer an "extravagant welcome."

The church plays an important role in the immigration discussion. Our faith tradition and sacred texts are saturated with stories about immigrants. We have a special ability and calling to reach out and love the neighbor--- all of our neighbors. Loving those on the margins, who often have cultural and life experiences much different than ours, takes education, courage, and intentional engagement with the sensibilities of our faith."

# Blood Pressure and You —

You have no doubt had your blood pressure checked numerous times, usually during every doctor visit, and you may have your own blood pressure machine at home to check it



whenever you need to or want to. One of the main reasons to monitor blood pressure is to detect the presence of hypertension, or high blood pressure, which increases the risk for heart attack or stroke. There are often no symptons, and hypertension is sometimes called a silent killer for that reason.

Recommended medical guidelines for normal ranges of blood pressure have changed over the years. There are two numbers, with the top number being called systolic (when the heart is contracting and pushing blood out into the body) and the lower number being called diastolic (when the heart is resting and being refilled with blood). The old guidelines defined hypertension as being over 149/90.

The new guidelines have the following categories:

- Normal: 120/80 or lower
- Elevated (previously called prehypertension): The systolic pressure is between 120 and 129 and the

diastolic pressure is 80 or lower. Elevated blood pressure can turn into high blood pressure if no action is taken. Lifestyle changes such as weight loss, healthy eating, and exercise can help.

- High blood pressure Stage 1: 130-139 for systolic or 80-89 for diastolic. Your doctor may suggest lifestyle changes or may prescribe medication.
- High blood pressure Stage 2: 140 or above for systolic or 90 or above for diastolic. Your doctor is likely to prescribe both lifestyle changes and medication.

If you do have hypertension, it is a good idea to monitor it at home in between doctor visits and consult your doctor if there is a significant change.

# Welcoming CPC Conference Minister Rev. Tyler Connoley

Our guest preacher on Sunday, February 2 will be the Rev. Tyler Connoley.

The Rev. Tyler Connoley was called to be our Conference Minister in November of 2019. They came to the CPC after serving in the conference settings of the Southwest and the Missouri Mid-South. They live in Portland and are a member of Waverly Heights UCC.

Tyler is fifth-generation clergy, so you could say church is in their DNA. They are also fifth-generation North-westerner on their father's side, with ancestors who settled in Star, Idaho and later moved to the Medford area and other parts of Oregon. Tyler grew up in Zambia, where their parents were missionaries in the Wesleyan Church, and came to the United Church of Christ in 2004.

Tyler has spent most of their adult life serving in the church, first as a lay leader and then as an ordained minister, including five years as a chaplain. Tyler loves connecting people, and helping them find their calling, and has years of experience in group and individual discernment processes, which they bring to local churches in times of transition and conflict. Their gentle prophetic voice persistently calls us to relationships of love and responsibility.

A biblical theologian and storyteller, Tyler has a Master of Arts in Religion and a Master of Divinity, both from Earlham School of Religion. Their undergraduate degree is in Business and Economics from Indiana Wesleyan University.

In addition to their ministry activities, Tyler is a small-business owner with their husband, Chef Rob Connoley.

### New Books in Smyrna's Library

(Note: Library has moved from Friendship House to the bookshelf in the Narthex.)

Back to the Well by Frances Taylor Gench. John Knox Press, 2004.

This book takes a deep dive into the gospel stories where women meet and sometimes confront Jesus in different ways. These encounters are some of the most powerful yet misunderstood parts of Jesus' story.

First Nations NewTestament. IVP, 2021. This version of the New Testament was translated through the languages of indigenous peoples of North America. Though the story remains the same, the wording and choices made within the text offer a fresh perspective and makes it feel a bit like meeting Jesus again for the first time.

Rescuing the Gospel From the Cowboys by Richard Twiss. IVP, 2015.

This book brings a unique understanding of the way the gospel is paired with cultural colonization. Richard Twiss, a Native American, brings in Native American wisdom and perspective to the gospel and suggests that Jesus may be brought to different populations without asking them to abandon their own culture for the culture of the ones who brought them the gospel.

Dan was born October 23, 1940 and passed away January 4, 2025. In his 84 years he lived a great life.



Dan also discovered that he enjoyed golfing, and was a member of Ranch Hills Golf Club.


