Dear Friends,

As I am writing this, it's a snow day, and I took the opportunity to stay up late last night to read Susan Faludi's newest book, <u>Into the Darkroom</u>. In it, Faludi explores her father's corporate identity as a child growing up within the Jewish community in Budapest before he moved to New York in the 1930's. She also learns about his evolving personal identity in his later years.

Identity. It is something that forms and changes within us, as individuals, and as members of communities, over the course of our entire lives from birth to death. We have a whole list of identities that we include in our call to worship – young, old, or in the middle; man, woman, teen or child; gay or straight; married, never-married, widowed, or divorced; healthy or ailing, and so forth. We have identities as members of communities – we connect with Canby, or Molalla, or Mt. Angel, or Salem. We identify

with different social interests, different civic engagements, different political opinions, and the list goes on and on of the ways our identities are shaped.

There is one part of our identity, however, that is held in common by all Christians – that we should be known by our love – love of God, neighbor, and ourselves. Jimmy Carter believed that we should live in a manner that if we were on trial for being Christian, there would be enough evidence to convict us. It's a good reminder for myself as we begin a new year.

That is why in the UCC we say this: "In essentials—unity, in non-essentials—diversity, and in all things—charity."

So in this season of giving, I give thanks for each of you, fellow travelers on this Christian journey, which started back in a little manger filled with God's love. May they know we are Christians by our love as we look to the future. Wishing you all a happy, healthy New Year!

Root Vegetable Gratin — Servings: 8 to 10

• **Time:** 2 to 2 1/4 hours



Once I realized how much this made, I divided it between two pans, one 3-quart baking dish and one 1-quart, freezing the larger one until I need it.

Garten's original recipe calls for 1/2 cup chicken broth and 2 1/2 cups heavy cream. I do not like gratins to be this rich and find much less cream goes a long way to impart richness, but not the kind that muffles flavors, so I used 2 cups broth and 1 cup cream. I also love mascarpone and/or creme fraiche in a gratin; you could use 1 cup of either here with an extra glug of milk or broth.

To make this ahead of time, you have many options but since a dish like this doesn't need to be baked *a la minute* to taste good, I'd go ahead and assemble and bake it as soon as you can. If just 1 to 3 days out, keep it in the fridge. 3 or more, freeze it. Make sure it spends a day in the fridge defrosting and then an hour on the counter shaking off its final chill before going in the oven (the last part mostly about protecting your stoneware, should it not be a friend to big temperature changes).

- Olive oil
- 1 large onion, sliced (1 1/2 cups)
- 2 cups (1/4-inch-sliced) fennel, top and core, if thick, removed

Carol Loe & her teddy bear & Cabbage Patch doll family

- 3 cloves garlic, minced (1 tablespoon)
- 1 pound peeled sweet potatoes, sliced 1/4-inch thick
- 1 pound celery root, peeled and sliced 1/4-inch thick
- 1 pound yukon gold, peeled and sliced 1/4-inch thick
- 1 cup heavy cream (see Note up top)
- 2 cups chicken or vegetable stock or brother
- 2 cups grated gruyere cheese (6 ounces with rind)
- 2 teaspoons minced fresh thyme leaves
- Kosher salt and freshly ground black pepper
- 2 1/2 cups coarse fresh breadcrumbs or panko (what I used)
- 2 to 3 tablespoons melted butter

Heat your oven to 350°F. Butter a 13×9-inch deep baking dish.

Heat 2 tablespoons olive oil in a large deep (ideally 12inch) saute pan over medium heat and add the onions and fennel. Cooking, tossing occasionally, until lightly browned and tender, about 10 minutes. Add the garlic and cook for one minute more.

Meanwhile, in the largest bowl you own, combine the onion mixture with remaining vegetables, cream, stock, cheese, thyme, 1 tablespoon kosher salt and 1 1/2 teaspoons black pepper. Pour mixture into prepared dish and spread until even. Mix breadcrumbs and butter until evenly coated and distribute evenly over top of dish.

Bake 1 1/2 hours uncovered, or until vegetables are very tender when tested with a small knife and the top is browned and bubbly. Allow to set for 15 minutes at room temperature and serve hot.

the money, and I have decided to use it as seed money to create things that can be used to generate additional income for mission. I love being at Smyrna, and I look forward to the years to come. Thank you!!






Christmas Eve and Christmas Day at Smyrna UCC

Earth Care Committee

The Earth Care Committee met on Dec. 13, 2016. One topic of discussion was recycling. We understand that the rate of recycling is down in Oregon, and we spent some time talking about what the Smyrna community could do to promote this important part of caring for our environment.



We have a brown cart outside the kitchen door for recyclables and a dumpster bin in the parking lot next to the newspaper drop box. There is concern that garbage and recycling are not being sorted properly. Several times someone has had to sort through the bin and remove items that are not recyclable:

shrink wrap, plastic containers such as cookies come in, cardboard cartons used for frozen food, plastic grocery bags, plastic clam shells, etc. It is confusing and we are working on some things we can do to make this work better.

We plan to laminate a large poster to place outside the kitchen door which will be a guide, and to have some materials available on the subject. Garbage in the blue can is picked up weekly early Monday morning; the recycling can is picked up the FIRST Monday of the month. The workers will come and get the cans, and we take them back in.

MEMORY CAFÉ

Our December Memory Café had 50 in attendance, and included two different programs. Stan Paine, from the Aging and Spirituality Network of the United Church of Christ, came from First Congregational United Church of Christ in Eugene, and brought information about that initiative across the conference, which is open to all.
