Dear Friends,

tories, some in refugee camps for more than 50 years. A week earlier, we welcomed Dr. Mike Huntington from Corvallis UCC, Dr. Tony Germain from the Salud Clinic in Woodburn, and Lee Mercer from Silverton, who talked about the need for healthcare for all. Connie Morrill from the Safe Driving program of AARP came to talk with folks at Memory Café earlier in the month. We also had guests visit us in worship, come to the Women's Fellowship Bazaar, and the Women's Fellowship Thanksgiving Luncheon.

November was a time of "all hands on deck" to make everything go smoothly for all of the activities mentioned above, along with everything else that happened over the past few weeks. Even Skyler, who has been gathering your money for children for change, knows that he has an important job to do at the church. He was overheard to say, "I need to do my job!"

"God has no hands but our hands," the 16th century preacher and teacher Rev. Jean Calvin of Geneva, Switzerland, was known to say. Our hands, our heads, and our hearts, are all needed.

But we are not alone. In this Advent season of waiting, which begins on December 1st this year, the first day of the new church year, we wait for the coming of the Christ child.
