Many people have heard of Oberlin College, but few today recall that Jean Oberlin, for whom that institution is named, was a minister who cared about the holistic health of the community of which he was a part. He worked with parishioners to improve their food and livelihoods by mulching and planting fruit trees on their rocky farms. He recruited those who could teach others, started the first kindergartens, and built grade schools for the area. He knew better roads were needed for trade, so he picked up a shovel and started to dig, and soon others were joining him.

Why did Oberlin do this, instead of just caring for souls? One biographer writes,


"Oberlin was a full century in advance of his day in this realization of the fact that...the gospel can mean relatively little to a people who by the state of things about them are merely existing, that the human soul cannot be adequately considered apart from its food, its home, its work, and its wages..." *

In this New Year, we too, are reminded that we are called to care for each other, and for our communities, in holistic ways. That's why we have classes for all ages, and collect food, clothing, household wares, send animals through Heifer Project, support for women being helped at the YMCA in Palestine, send kids to Camp Adams and Youth Events, and much, much more.

- ⇒ Place a pair of shoes and flashlight near bed so they'll be handy after disaster
