During this time of year we often wonder if the upper respiratory infection we have is	a cold or the
flu. Here is a chart to help determine which it is.	

COLD	SYMPTOM	I FLU	
Pretty rare	Fever	Usually present	
Slight body aches & pains	Aches	Severe body aches & pain	
Uncommon	Chills	Fairly common	
Fairly mild	Fatigue	Moderate to severe	
Develop over a few days	Sudden Symptoms	Rapid onset of 3-6 hours	
Hacking & productive	Coughing	Dry and nonproductive	
Common	Sneezing	Uncommon	
Common	Stuffy Nose	Uncommon	
Mild to moderate	Sore Throat	Uncommon	
Mild to moderate	Chest Discomfort	Often Severe

Unlike colds, flu can lead to complications like pneumonia, especially in the old, the young, and those with serious health issues. Viruses are transmitted by contact with objects that the infected person has touched after coughing or sneezing. Germs can be transmitted 1 day before symptoms appear and up to 5 days after getting sick. AVOID GETTING THIS SEASONS MOST COMMON FLU BY GET-TING A FLU SHOT!

Stay Healthy by eating well, exercising regularly, getting plenty of rest, and practicing good hand washing. If you have a cold or the flu, cover your nose and mouth with a tissue or elbow when coughing/sneezing, avoid people while ill, wash your hands after coughing/sneezing, and avoid touching your eyes, nose or mouth.

If you are ill stay home, don't share your germs. Treat your symptoms by hydrating yourself, getting plenty of rest, gargling to moisten a sore throat, drinking hot liquids to relieve nasal congestion, taking a steamy shower to clear nasal passages, applying hot or cold packs to congested sinuses, using an extra pillow when sleeping to relieve congestion, and avoiding travel by air. If you are healthy, share Jesus love by taking the sick one the standard chicken soup or fluids and caring for the children!





Carl Fredrick Cline

March 5, 1955 — *October 18*, 2018

Carl Fredrick Cline, descendant of Jacob and Sarah Spilman Robbins, Oregon Pioneers of an 1852 wagon train, died on October 18, 2018 at Pheasant Pointe Assisted Living in Molalla. Born at the Silverton Hospital on March 5, 1955. he was 63 years old.

Carl's pioneer roots were deep. He was the son of Orville

Cline and Gena Muller Cline of Molalla. His maternal grandparents were Frank Fredrick Muller and Zella Shaver Muller. Zella's parents were William Auther Shaver and Della Gena Robbins Shaver. Great great grandparents were Levi Robbins and Ediff Barger, descendants of Jacob and Sarah Robbins. All are buried in the Adams Cemetery overlooking the farm where Carl lived his entire life. The farm belonged to Frank and Zella Muller, and when Orville and Gena were married, the farm was presented to them as a wedding gift. Today it still remains in the family, and Carl's sister,



Christine Cline Foster and brother-in-law, Virgil Randel Foster currently live there.

In the past the farm was a self-sustaining family farm raising sheep, beef, pigs, chickens and various crops. Carl's father farmed until 1978, when he began employment at Molalla Union High School. At that time 68 acres were leased to the Holiday Christmas Trees. The sheep still remained. Carl took over much of their care.

In 1989, Carl started working for Smuckers in Woodburn, a food processing plant. He was a member of the teamsters. He worked with Smuckers until 2003. The Romney sheep were part of the farm until December of last year. Carl had fallen off some bales of hay in the barn and broken a femur. At this time, his health started declining,

and it became evident that it would be impossible to take care of the sheep so they

were sold. It was sad for the family to watch the last of the sheep operation leave when it was something that had been such a large part of the farm.

Carl was an avid cartoonist. He was extremely gifted, and all he needed was a pencil and paper and it was like magic. He became alive with the process; it was a way of expression. He had cartoons published in the Molalla Pioneer, Capitol Press, and the Shepherd. For several years he had award winning cartoons at the Homer Davenport Festival in Silverton.

Carl exhibited Romney sheep at the Clackamas County and Oregon State Fairs for many years in 4-H. He was part of the Teasel Creek 4-H livestock

club led by Orville and neighbor Wanda Daugherty. He was also involved in Molalla High School's FFA. Later he and Christine helped show *The Cline Family Romneys* at the State Fair for many years.

He was a member of the Molalla Historical Society, and when the Apple Festival came around, he was always helping with the apple cider making process. He was a member and Master of the Molalla Grange #310 and attended Smyrna United Church of Christ.

Carl's paternal grandparents were Maria Lydia Wacken Cline and Lester Carl Cline. They operated a farm in the Parker area on Old Fort Road close to Rickreall, Monmouth, and Independence. There were two ponds stocked with rainbow trout and many fishing trips were remembered as well as community picnics at the farm on the Luckiamute River. Rivers ran through both farms, and the farm in Molalla borders the Molalla River.

Carl attended Molalla Elemtary and Molalla Union High School graduating in 1973. This was followed by two years at Clackamas Community College.

Carl and his sister Christine were truly blessed to have such a good life growing up on the family farm with *All Creatures Great and Small*, various animals—family dogs and cats touched and enriched their lives.
