

by Aquiles Nazoa, illustrated by Ana Palmero Caceres (found in Smyrna's Church Library)


A simple and visually pleasing retelling of Christmas story by a Venezualan poet and illustrated by a fellow Venezualan. This one is



As Julie Keene and I traveled around the country doing workshops in various churches and other settings, we were constantly meeting women, both young and old, who for various reasons, found themselves alone. Some were widowed. some divorced, or some had never married and felt they'd always be alone. Many were fearful, and some almost despondent about their future. Many were very desperately looking for a partner.

But on the other hand, we were often amazed at the resilience with which some women were confronting their fears and finding alternative ways of creating a meaningful life. This book was written to honestly look at the issues women alone were experiencing and then to look at the ways many had found to pick up the threads of their lives, fulfill their needs, and create a new and meaningful life in spite of the situations they were encountering.

Written to be a self-help book, it covers a wide range of topics that being alone presents, such as how to confront loneliness and to build support systems, parenting in a single household, finances, and aging alone, among many other subjects. There are stories of real people who have given permission to have their stories told hoping to help others create their own ways of finding a new and meaningful life. Each chapter ends with both a summary and as list of action steps one may take.



Flu Season tips

How can you tell whether you have the flu or a common cold?

That can be tricky. The flu can cause a fever, headaches, body aches, a cough, a runny nose, and fatigue - all symptoms that

can also turn up among people who have a common cold. But the flu tends to cause a fever of 100 degrees or higher as well as headaches and body aches or chills, while the common cold typically does not. The common cold tends to come on gradually during a period of a couple of days, while the flu often lands more abruptly. If someone goes from feeling well to feeling crummy in the space of an hour or two, that's more indicative of the flu than of the common cold.

How should you treat symptoms of the flu?

If you're otherwise healthy, the flu tends to cause unpleasant but mild symptoms. You may feel feverish and stuffed up, but you don't need urgent medical care. A few days rest and over the counter drugs such as aspirin or acetaminophen will relieve your aches and fever, and a decongestant can turn off your runny nose.

On the other hand, women who are pregnant, those who are 65 and older, kids age five and younger, and people with medical conditions like asthma, cancer, or diabetes are all at high risk for flu-related complications such as pneumonia or bronchitis. If you are a member (or a caretaker) of one of these at-risk groups, call a doctor if you think you have the flu. Your doctor may recommend that you take an "antiviral", to knock out the flu infection. But you need to start taking antiviral drugs 48 hours or less after your symptoms start, so don't wait to call your doc.
