Dear Smyrna friends,

Spring has sprung: cherry blossoms, daffodils, daphne, hyacinth - so many signs of new life!

On a recent drive through Aurora to Hubbard and back, the joy of seeing the vibrant and colorful signs of new life, was periodically pierced by sorrow at the sight of so many downed, broken-branch-ridden, and mangled trees.

The damage from February's ice storm will be visible for years – maybe for as long as the trees that were damaged live on. All across our state are trees bearing scars from natural disasters (whether due to wind, fire, or ice). They remind us how vulnerable and resilient the created beings of Creation are (trees and humans alike!). My scenic drive was a reminder of all the ways beauty and brokenness co-exist in our world.

April comes in the middle of Holy Week this year; on Maundy Thursday.

The root word for maundy is *mandatum*, meaning mandate or commandment. On the Thursday of Holy Week, it is common for churches observing the events of Jesus' Passion, to demonstrate or offer a foot washing, as Jesus had washed the feet of his disciples right before giving them a new commandment that they love one another. "Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another. By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another" (John 13:34-35).

Via Zoom, we will hear a reading of this commandment, commemorate The Last Supper, and listen to the telling of Jesus' Passion (the events that led up to his crucifixion) through excerpts from the four gospels.

My first Maundy Thursday service happened about 8 months into my first year of going to church weekly and participating in almost everything. It was during that service that I decided I would become a member of the church. I don't know what touched me most deeply – witnessing the intimacy and humility of Jesus' love in the washing of his friends' feet; sharing the meal "where death and life meet"; or how it felt to be with Jesus in his Passion (the way God is with us in our times of suffering). Maybe it was the combination. Maybe it was the way that experience prepared me to expect the transformative power of God's Love; the way it prepared me to expect new life after death (Easter would be coming!).

We won't be back in the building for Easter this year, but the time for re-gathering is coming (and we have a newly established committee to plan for it!).

Participating in Holy Week can help us embrace all the ways beauty and brokenness co-exist in our world. May you be blessed by all the signs of new life that spring, herd immunity, and the risen Christ among us will bring!

Cemetery Update

We are very pleased that so many willing hands have helped to clear away all the debris from the ice storm disaster in February. We have been giving away the wood first come, first served and asking for donations to be given to the food bank.

The church grounds and the cemetery will need extensive work by tree services to take care of the damage. Two trees need to be removed, one from disease and the other because a large portion broke away and fell across the fence. Part of the tree service will be to remove broken limbs high in the air and trim back all stubs from broken limbs. We need to do all we can to mitigate the exposure to disease caused by all the wounds. We will have to repair the brick columns at the gate and the wrought iron and chain-link fences.

Mary Yoder, a lifelong member of the church, who was born the year the church was founded and lived to be 99 years old, told me something about the oaks. I was remarking about the wonderful grove we had, and she said that they came up after the fire. I assumed that when land was being cleared around the church and brush was being burned, the fir trees that had been there were consumed. That would make the oaks about 125 years old. One of the ones taken down several years ago proved that to be true. Wouldn't it be nice to cut a slice out of one of the trees to be removed to preserve and make a display of the oaks and our history?

EarthCare Committee Report

Portland General Electric has chosen Smyrna to be one of nine nonprofit or-

ganizations in PGE's territory to receive grants for renewable energy projects. We have worked on this project for over two years with the able assistance of Energy Solutions of Oregon City. Chet Zimmer and Grant Lindsley met with us numerous times and developed a plan for installing a solar array to produce electricity. We will be able to sell back the energy we produce, and that money will be more than enough to cover our monthly bills.

It was not enough to say in our grant that the main purpose of the grant is to pay our bills. We were required to develop a plan for educating the community about the methods and benefits of going renewable. The project will be started soon.

HEART HEALTH Heart Attack Symptoms:

- 1. Pressure, tightness, pain, or a squeezing or aching sensation in your chest or arms that may spread to your neck, jaw or back
- 2. Nausea, indigestion, heartburn or abdominal pain
- 3. Shortness of breath
- 4. Cold sweat
- 5. Fatigue, weak
- 6. Lightheadedness or sudden dizziness

Not all people who have heart attacks have the same symptoms or have the same severity of symptoms. Some heart attacks strike suddenly, but many people have warning signs and symptoms hours, days or weeks in advance. The earliest warning might be recurrent chest pain or pressure (angina) that's triggered by activity and relieved by rest.

What is a Heart Attack?

A heart attack occurs when one or more of your coronary arteries become blocked . . . The blockage is most often a buildup of fat, cholesterol and other substances, which form a plaque in the arteries that feed the heart (coronary arteries), this is called Atherosclerosis. This condition, called coronary artery disease, causes most heart attacks

Sometimes a plaque can rupture and form a clot that blocks blood flow, starving the heart of oxygen and nutrients (ischemia).

Another cause of a heart attack is a spasm of a coronary artery that shuts down blood flow to part of the heart muscle. The interrupted blood flow can damage or destroy part of the heart muscle. Using tobacco and illicit drugs, such as cocaine, can cause a life-threatening spasm.

Infection with COVID-19 may also damage your heart in ways that result in a heart attack

What to do if you feel you are having a heart attack

- 1. **Call 911 Call immediately Don't hesitate**. Drive yourself only if there are no other options. Because your condition can worsen, driving yourself puts you and others at risk.
- 2. Take nitroglycerin if prescribed to you by a doctor
- 3. Take aspirin, if recommended.

Heart Attack risk factors include:

- 1. Age Men 45 or older and women 55 or older are most at risk
- 2. Tobacco smoking and long-term exposure to secondhand smoke
- 3. High blood pressure. Over time, high blood pressure can damage arteries that lead to your heart. High blood pressure

- that occurs with other risk factors, such as obesity, high cholesterol or diabetes, increases your risk even more.
- 4. High blood cholesterol or triglyceride levels. A high level of low-density lipoprotein (LDL), or "bad cholesterol" is most likely to narrow arteries. A high level of triglycerides (a blood fat related to your diet) also increases your risk of a heart attack. A high level of high-density lipoprotein (HDL) or "good cholesterol" may lower your risk
- 5. Obesity is linked with high blood cholesterol levels, high triglyceride levels, high blood pressure and diabetes. Losing just 10% of your body weight can lower this risk.
- 6. Diabetes increases heart attack risk
- 7. Metabolic syndrome occurs when you have obesity, high blood pressure and high blood sugar making you twice as likely to develop heart disease.
- 8. Family history if your siblings, parents, or grandparents have had early heart attack (by age 55 for males or by age 65 for females) you may be at increased risk.
- 9. Lack of physical activity contributes to high blood cholesterol levels and obesity.
- 10. Response to stress
- 11. Illicit drug use
- 12. Autoimmune diseases such as rheumatoid arthritis or lupus can increase your risk of a heart attack

Prevention:

It's never too late to take steps to prevent a heart attack – even if you've already had one. Here are ways to prevent a heart attack:

Medications – Take what your doctor has prescribed for you, and ask your doctor how often you need to be monitored.

Lifestyle factors – You know the drill: Maintain a healthy weight with a heart-healthy diet, don't smoke, exercise regularly, manage stress and control conditions that can lead to a heart attack, such as high blood pressure, high cholesterol and diabetes.
