



Steps to take to stay well this flu season

- 1. Practice good food health habits: get plenty of sleep, be physically active, manage your stress, drink plenty of fluids, and eat nutritious food
- 2. Wash your hands often with warm water and soap for 20 seconds (it takes 20 seconds to sing Happy Birthday TWICE), rinse, then dry completely.
- 3. Hand sanitizer is a good second option to washing. Use when your hands are not visibly dirty. Put a dollop of sanitizer and rub into your hands, covering all surfaces for 20 seconds or until dry.
- 4. Pay particular attention to cleansing hands before contact with others such as shaking hands, etc, or eating or drinking.
- 5. Stay home when you are sick.
- 6. Cough or sneeze into the crook of your arm, or into a tissue you then dispose of properly.
- 7. Avoid touching your eyes, nose or mouth. Germs are often spread when a person touches something that is contaminated with germs and then touches his or her eyes, nose, or mouth.
- 8. Use a disinfectant cloth to wipe down surfaces often touched: phones, countertops, TV remotes, door handles, toilet handles, computer keyboard & mouse, light switches, etc.....
- 9. Get a flu shot- the CDC recommends everyone 6 months and older get a flu vaccination every year. Vaccination is especially important for: people 50 years and older, children 6 months through 4 years old, women who are or will be pregnant during flu season, people with chronic medical conditions or weakened immune systems, people who live in nursing homes and other longterm care centers, health care workers, people who live with or care for anyone at high risk for flurelated complications. Complications of flu can include bacterial pneumonia, ear infections, sinus infections, dehydration, and worsening of chronic medical conditions, such as congestive heart failure, asthma, or diabetes.

Smyrna Library Update:

Smyrna is updating its library offerings and this month's new book is a novel by best-selling author SUE MONK KIDD: "THE BOOK OF LONGINGS." Published in 2020, the book is arounded in meticulous research and with a



reverential approach to Jesus' life that focuses on his humanity.

Ana, raised in a wealthy family with ties to the ruler of Galilee, is a daring and brilliant spirit expected to marry an older widower, a prospect which horrifies her. Then an encounter with Jesus changes everything as they fall in love.

# A very big thanks and hooray!

We have finally done it. After nearly three years in the planning, the solar array at the church is completed and has been busily producing kilowatts of electricity since June 15 of this year. Energy Solutions, our contractor from Oregon City took care of the installation which was completed in four days. They were wonderful to work with. We also appreciate Kevin Bany, Bany Fence Co, Inc for installing the chain link fencing.

We could not have done this without a major award from Portland General Electric's Renewable Development Fund made possible by the Green Future<sup>SM</sup> renewable power program. To date, PGE Green Future<sup>SM</sup> customers have helped fund more than 14.5 Megawatts of new, local renewable energy generation. 


We postponed the Ribbon-Cutting, originally scheduled to take place on September 12, due to concerns about the surge in COVID virus infections. We intend to reschedule when conditions improve.

We have a real-time energy program, Solar Edge, that monitors the production. As you read this, we will have produced kilowatts worth over \$800 since June 15. This equates to over 10,500 lbs of CO2 emissions and is the equivalent of over 80 trees planted.
