The 3 Main Advent Colors Are Full of Meaning

If you've ever noticed that advent candle colors come in three main shades, you might have wondered why that is.

Each of these candle colors – purple, pink, and white – represents a specific element of spiritual preparation that believers undergo leading up to the celebration of Christmas.

The purpose of the season of Advent is to prepare one's heart for the coming of Christ at Christmas.

During these four weeks, an Advent wreath adorned with five candles is traditionally used to symbolize different spiritual aspects of getting ready.

The three Advent candle colors – purple, pink, and white symbolically represent the spiritual preparation that believers undergo to prepare their hearts for the birth (or coming) of the Lord, Jesus Christ.

The Advent wreath, typically a circular garland of evergreen branches is a symbol of eternity and unending love.

Purple (or violet) symbolizes repentance and fasting. Purple is also the color of royalty and the sovereignty of Christ. So, purple demonstrates the anticipation of and reception of the coming King celebrated during Advent

The first candle of the Advent wreath, the prophecy candle, or candle of hope, is purple. The second is called the Bethlehem candle, or the candle of preparation, and it is also purple. The fourth Advent candle is also purple, and is called the angel candle, or the candle of love.

Pink represents joy or rejoicing and reveals a shift in the season of Advent away from repentance and toward celebration. The third Advent candle is pink. It is named the shepherd candle or candle of joy

White is the Advent candle representing purity, light, regeneration, and godliness. White is also a symbol of victory. Jesus Christ is the sinless, spotless, pure Savior. He is the light come into a dark and dying world. He is often depicted in the Bible wearing radiant, intensely white robes, like snow or pure wool, and shining with the brightest of light. The Christ candle is the last of fifth Advent candle, positioned in the center of the wreath.

This Advent candle's color is white.

Mission and Outreach

At the Church Council Meeting, it was voted to send \$500 each to the Canby & Molalla food banks, and another \$500 each for Christmas as we have done in previous years.

Good news from our November Children for Change effort, "Fill a Stocking, Fill a Heart." We have delivered 83 stockings

made by women in the church, a check for \$400, and some things to fill those stockings. More will be delivered early next month. The stockings go to various agencies in Clackamas County to be distributed to those in need.



Paulette continues to take food items to the Molalla Service Center, and our container is over half full. Easy to prepare dinners and toilet tissue are still being requested. As winter approaches, continue to bring items to the church.

In October we completed a successful campaign to assist the Quilts for Empowerment organization. We helped them to meet their matching challenge grant. In early November we had the opportunity to speak via zoom with Norah Otondo in Kenya during the adult education time. The children sang "Count Your Blessings," to our delight.

During December we will join with UCC churches across the nation to support the Christmas Fund. For over 100 years, its goal has been to provide emergency grants, to supplement small annuities, to help pay health premiums, and to send thank you gift checks to lower income retired clergy and lay employees of the United Church of Christ.


WALK TO BETHLEHEM

Advent is the start, the arrival, the dawn of a journey that leads us not only to the manger where we find the Christ-child, but to a new understanding of our relationship to the world and to one another as people of faith. Advent is a journey in which the traveling is as full of lessons as the destination. As such, the season is a journey of faith.

An enduring traditional image of the Christmas story for me is Mary sitting on her donkey being led by Joseph who is walking. Walking was as integral to the lives of Mary, Joseph and later Jesus as cars are to us. I am drawn to the discipline of walking as a way to connect Scripture to our lives in a tangible way.

As this is a journey, I hope you will consider walking daily as a symbolic discipline of your Advent journey.

Every week will begin with a psalm and the opportunity to set a "movement goal" or a reasonable physical challenge for yourself. There will be short daily devotions in each week's bulletin to meditate on while on this journey. You movement goal may be walking or running miles, taking more steps each



day, going for a daily walk, wearing a pedometer to count the distance you walk each day, sit and be fit class, water aerobics, virtual exercise class, or even housework! 15 minutes of any exercise counts as one mile. We have 6,937 miles from Canby to Bethlehem. We will track our total miles accomplished each week starting the first Sunday in Advent (November 28). Each week during announcements in the service we will announce our progress. If we all work together we can accomplish this!

HOW TO STAY IN CONTACT WITH OTHERS IN AN EMERGENCY

BEFORE A DISASTER: How to prepare your home and mobile device

- 1. Maintain a list of emergency phone numbers in your cell phone and on or near your home phone.
- 2. Keep your cell phone close by and charged at all times (you never know when an emergency may strike)
- Keep charged batteries and car-phone chargers available for back-up power for your cell phones. Consider buying a non electric charger in case of long power outages – charging pacs come solar, electric, and manual winding chargers (these take A LOT of effort!). These are all good for multiple charges
- 4. If you have a traditional landline (non-broadband or VOIP) phone, keep at least one non-cordless phone in your home because it will work even if you lose power.
- 5. Prepare a family contact sheet. This should include at least one out-of-town contact that may be better able to reach family members in an emergency.
- 6. Program "in case of emergency" (ICE) contacts into your cell phone so emergency personnel can contact those people for you if you are unable to use your phone. Let your ICE contacts know that they are programmed into your phone And inform them of Any medical issues or other special needs you may have.
- If you are evacuated and have call-forwarding on your home phone, forward your home phone number to your cell phone number.
- 8. If you do not have a cell phone, keep a prepaid phone card to use if needed during or after a disaster
- 9. Have a battery-powered radio or television available (with spare batteries).
- Subscribe to text alert services from local or state governments to receive alerts in the event of a disaste4r. Parents should sign up for their school district emergency alert system
- 11. In a disaster, your most immediate source of help is the neighbors around you. Consider creating a disaster plan with your neighbors. A comprehensive guide for creating this is the Map Your Neighborhood (MYN) guide in the top slot of literature disply at Smryna — across from the entry door.

During and After a Disaster; How to Reach Friends, Loved ones and Emergency Services

- 1. If you have a life-threatening emergency, call 911. Remember you cannot currently text 911. If you are not experiencing an emergency, do not call 911. If your area offers 311 service or another information system, call that number for non-emergencies
- 2. For non-emergency communications, use text messaging, e-mail, or social media instead of making voice call on your cell phone to avoid tying up voice networks. In addition to Facebook and Twitter, you can use resources such as the American Red Cross's Safe and Well program.
- Keep all phone calls brief. If you need to use a phone, try to convey only vital information to emergency personnel and/or family.
- 4. If you are unsuccessful in completing a call using your cell phone, wait ten seconds before redialing to help reduce network congestion
- 5. Conserve your cell phone battery by reducing the brightness of your screen, placing your phone in airplane mode, and closing apps you are not using that draw power, unless you need to use the phone.
- 6. If you lose power, you can charge your cell phone in your car, just be sure your car is in a well ventilated place (remove it from the garage) and do not go to your car until any danger has passed. You can also listen to your car radio for important news alerts.
- 7. If you do not have a hands-free device in your car, stop driving or pull over to the side of the road before making a call.

 Do not text on a cell phone, talk, or "tweet" without a hands free device while driving.
- 8. Immediately following a disaster, resist using your mobile device to watch streaming videos, or play video games, all of which can add to network congestion. Limiting use of these services can help potentially life-saving emergency calls get through to 911



Keep a GO bag under the bed on your side. Easy to grab in case you need to evacuate quickly at night. Be sure it includes all needed medications and a pair of hard soled, enclosed shoes in case you need to navigate through broken glass.
