The notation about it in the New Century Hymnal says: Folliott S. Pierpoint, author of numerous hymns, penned these verses near his native city of Bath, England, on a late spring day when flowers were in full bloom and all the earth seemed to rejoice. The first verse and refrain is:

For the beauty of the earth, for the beauty of the skies, For the love which from our birth over and around us lies, Lord of all, to thee we raise this our grateful hymn of praise.

What if, for the month of July, we noticed or looked for all the ways the earth seems to rejoice? How might it bless us to sing the first verse and refrain every time we notice the beauty of the earth or sky? Sometimes we repeat to ourselves a worry or a resentment or a negative thought about ourselves over and over throughout the day (or throughout our lives) — not because we mean to, just because that's how the mind works. Let's practice training our brains to repeat a grateful hymn of praise.

Then, when we gather for **Smyrna's annual Camp Adams Sunday on July 24th** we'll sing it together for our opening hymn! Worship will begin at 11 am, and fellowship over a bring-your-own lunch will follow. Diaconate will provide coffee, water, and juice. Plans for post lunch activities (including swimming if we can find a lifeguard) are in the works. Transition Team Report

Background: The Search and Call Committee was elected at the beginning of the year. Their first job was to find an interim minister to serve the church. After meeting with Rev. Tyler Connolly, the Central Pacific Conference minister, we began our work. Most of the work in the beginning was working around creating the job posting, interviewing candidates, and determining compensation for the interim. We recommended Revs. Cat Allard and Janet Parker be called as our intentional interim pastors and the Council approved our recommendation. Pastors Cat and Janet began in March.

Next, it was time for a subgroup of people to shepherd the church through the first phases of the interim period—working with the congregation to explore the three questions for churches in transition (Who are we? Who is our neighbor? Who is God calling us to become?) and to work on the church profile. This is the transition team, made up of three search and call members, the interim pastors and one other person. (Jane Dahl, Sheila Daniels, Barb Menkel, and Debi Veatch)

Writing the church profile is an important part of the process, as it helps to find a good fit for Smyrna.

The Transition Team has met two times. We were asked to do some readings about meeting guidelines, and some articles about working through the interim time and working on the profile.

In order for the transition team to do their work, under the guidance of Pastor Janet and Pastor Cat, we will be having several "Transition Sundays". The first of these will be July 17, during the worship service, when we will focus on Smyrna's history. We will begin the process of gathering information to use in writing our church profile. We hope you'll help us by participating in our activities and keeping us in your prayers!


SLEEP — Part Two

How much sleep do you need?

A published in the journal Heart a couple years ago, a Swiss study found that adults who took one or two daytime naps per week had a lower risk of heart disease and strokes than non nappers. More naps per week did not further decrease risk. A 20 minute nap is enough to reap benefits. These cardiovascular benefits did not apply as people aged - no benefits were found in people over 65.

Recommended hours of sleep by age group:

Newborns (0-3 months)	14-17 hours
Infants (4-11 months)	12-15 hours
Toddlers (1-2 years)	9-11 hours
Preschoolers (3-5)	10-13 hours
School-age children (6-13)	9-11 hours
Teenagers (14-17)	8-10 hours
Young adults (18-25)	7-9 hours
Adults (24-64)	7-9 hours
Seniors (65 and older)	7-8 hours




<u>Transitions: Making Sense of Changes</u> by William Bridges. Da Capo Press. 2004.
