**Our Faith, Our Vote: The UCC and the practice of democracy** On November 8, Americans will choose their new leaders through the biennial democratic (small-d) ritual of voting. I can still remember how excited I was to turn 18 and be able to vote for the first time. Over the many years that I have been eligible to vote, I have won some and lost some, but what is more important than whether I won or lost is the fact that I had the *right* to vote and the *access* to exercise that right. As an amateur student of American history, I don't take that for granted. My great-grandmothers were the first generation of women in my family who had the right to vote. If I were an African American, my parents' generation may have been the first generation in my family to be able to exercise their right to vote.

As many of you know, I've been co-teaching a class on "Faith and Democracy in Crisis" during September and October, and we've been learning about the crisis that our democracy is facing at this time. Regardless of which end of the political spectrum you're on, most people seem to agree that our democracy is in peril, even as we may disagree as to the causes and solutions for the crisis. But is this something Christians need to be talking about *in church*? I grew up learning that one of the cardinal rules of polite society was not to talk about religion or politics—much less religion AND politics. And yet, I have become convinced that Christians, and all people of faith, need to find a way to talk about politics because our faith was not meant to be sealed off from the rest of our lives, but to inform all of our lives.

To be clear, I am *not* advocating for partisan debates or endorsing particular candidates. I *am* advocating for the recognition that politics has a moral dimension that touches on the issues of justice, inclusion, and wholeness/shalom that Jesus cared deeply about. But don't take my word for it. I'd like to share with you, in closing, an

excerpt from a piece called "Voting Is Sacred," by the Director of the UCC Office for Public Policy and Advocacy, Sandy Sorensen. She writes about the UCC's <u>"Our Faith Our Vote"</u> campaign and the relationship between faith and politics as the UCC sees it:

"Throughout the Hebrew and Christian Scriptures, we encounter the core faith understanding...that to be in right relationship with God. we must be in right relationship with each other in human community. We are called time and again to love God and our neighbor by ordering our community life with justice and compassion. Public policy decisions and political structures are simply the way we order our common life. Those decisions reflect our moral values and priorities. The decisions made by those we elect have widereaching impact. We can amplify or undo countless acts of direct service ministry - serving meals, stocking food pantries, building affordable housing, working with at risk-children and youth, and so much more, by who we put into office to make policy decisions. Since 2004, the United Church of Christ has invited members and congregations to participate in nonpartisan election engagement as part of living their faith and working to create a just world for all. The campaign includes resources for engaging in nonpartisan voter registration, issue education and voter mobilization and protection. The UCC Our Faith Our Vote campaign seeks to be faithful to the call of the 11th General Synod of the UCC, which affirms the work of the church in 'equipping the saints for the task of prophetic ministry within the biblical tradition' and to 'pursue this ministry by providing voter registration, public hearings on policy issues and encouraging participation in the political process."

#### **Transition Team Update**

The Transition Team would like to thank everyone who was able to participate in the Transition Sunday exercise on October 16. During worship, we were delighted to hear from Vice Moderator, Ginger Redlinger, who offered a reflection on the interim process at Smyrna. Approximately 28 members were able to stay after the service and enjoy coffee and desserts before separating into discussion groups. The focus of the exercise was Smyrna's Mission Statement. The results of that exercise provided important and insightful information necessary to complete our Local Church Profile for our search for a settled pastor. It also helped us identify priorities for the church.

After the breakout groups did their work, everyone voted on what they wanted to give their energy to in the next year or so. Below, please find the outcomes from each of the three breakout groups that reflected on our Mission Statement, in order of the number of votes received. There is still some information to gather, but we are happy to share that we are now turning our focus to the writing of the Local Church Profile. We hope to have at least a rough draft done by the end of December.

Outcomes from reflections on the Mission Statement:

Ginger facilitated a group that reflected on the first section of the Mission Statement:

\*(Smyrna UCC is striving to be) A place of peace, where we offer to all an extravagant welcome wherever you are in your life journey regardless of your ethnicity, marital status, religion, gender, race, age, disability, national origin, or sexual orientation, and where we teach the stories of God's love and call on our lives.

The group reflected on what it means in our time to offer an "extravagant welcome." They discussed the idea of offering transportation to church for elderly members, and they came up with two specific examples of how to live into Smyrna's commitment to be "a place of peace." These are: creating an intergenerational or adult-focused Peace Camp; and following through on Smyrna's interest in becoming a Just Peace Church (one of the congregational commitments that churches are invited to make in the United Church of Christ).

The six word statement that summarizes their discussion: Become a Just Peace Church Soon!

This statement received 18 "I have energy to give to this" votes.

Pastor Cat facilitated a group that reflected on the third section of the Mission Statement:

\*(Smyrna UCC is striving to be) A lighthouse of God's compassion, where worship, teaching, learning, and spiritual growth take place in community, powered by thought and action.

The group focused on two examples of living out this mission priority in the year ahead: Re-starting Memory Café and offering another Peace Camp in the summer of 2023. They identified what would be needed to manifest these offerings.\*\*

The six word statement that summarizes this is: Programs relevant to the wider community.

This statement received 14 "I have energy to give to this" votes.

Sheila facilitated a group that reflected on the second section of the Mission Statement:

\*(Smyrna UCC is striving to be) A spiritual haven, where we accept and care for all people and God's creation in an outreach of grace.

The group focused on caring for God's creation and caring for one another. We can care for God's creation by addressing climate change and offering recycling workshops and helping people organize to purchase solar panels for their homes. We also want to be a Spiritual Haven of God's grace where people accept and care for one another. We can do more to welcome new people to our church while contacting members who have not been coming. We need to share our traditions and respect all faiths.

An eight-word statement that summarizes this: We work, we help, we respect, we serve.

This statement received 10 "I have energy to give to this" votes.

The fourth section of the Mission Statement, which reads, "A Christian people, working for God's realm in ecumenical harmony with other people of faith and conviction," did not draw enough attention from participants to warrant its own breakout group. But perhaps the sentiments and values expressed in this section can inform the work on all of the others. And it is certainly reflected in the importance of respecting all faith traditions that was lifted up in Sheila's group.

\*\*Since our voting exercise didn't allow for people to indicate if they were interested in giving their energy to a particular program, please let Pastor Cat know if you would like to be involved in the effort to re-start Memory Café, and/or the effort to plan for next year's Peace Camp. When a critical mass has come forward to say "I'm in!" planning will begin!


#### **EMERGENCY TIP OF THE MONTH**



Imagine all of us praying together at the same time! I can't promise you'll feel a palpable feeling of connection (at first anyway), but some of you may. I've set a daily alarm with a special ringtone ("Ripples") on my phone. When it went off yesterday (my day off, which was spent cleaning and organizing my new apartment) I hadn't sat down once all day. When I sat down I thoroughly welcome the opportunity to pause, be still, and connect with Spirit. I prayed for specific members of Smyrna, for future members of Smyrna, for the vitality and future of the church, for the land Smyrna owns and stewards, for the communities within Smyrna's reach. It was such a beautiful experience, I allowed it to go on for more than a moment!

However long you pray, in whatever way - maybe you say the Lord's Prayer, or pause to look at your surroundings with awe and thanksgiving - your practice will be felt by those of us who "feel" the connection at 6 PM, and of course, it will be spiritual "clay" for God who continues to shape us as a community of faith!
