What are *you* seeking this Lent? By Pastor Janet

Pastor Cat and I are delighted to be walking with you through Lent this year using a Lenten resource that Pastor Cat found called "seeking: honest questions for deeper faith." Lent provides a wonderful opportunity for reflecting on our lives at a deeper level than we normally make time for. It's a season when, at least in church, we honor and make space for opening our hearts to the needs, questions, and concerns of our soul. Far from being the dour and austere time that we often associate with Lent, this season can be a time for inspiration, joy, and discovery as we make time to nurture our spirits and our relationship with God. You may still wish to "give something up" for Lent, though that is not required. But as Pastor Cat said at our Ash Wednesday service, it can also be a time to take something on-a new spiritual practice. This year, we are inviting everyone into the spiritual practice of seeking-of living with our difficult questions about our lives and about God, and of living into new insights when, by God's grace, they come.

Lent is the 40-day period (not including Sundays) that begins on Ash Wednesday and concludes with Holy Saturday (the day before Easter). Lent will be underway by the time you receive **this, but if you haven't yet given yourself a few moments to med**itate on what you are seeking in your heart of hearts this Lent, I invite you to do so now. Find a quiet place where you can be alone or uninterrupted, take some deep breaths, and consciously invite your awareness to turn towards Spirit, who is around us and within us at all times. Once your mind has settled and your heart is quiet, simply ask yourself this question, "What am I seeking at this time in my life?" You may sense an answer to

your question through words or images that swim up into your consciousness, but if you don't, that's okay...the important thing is to ask, and live with, the question. Just asking the question is radical and transformative; it signals your openness to change, to Spirit's movement in your life. To aid your meditative practice, I invite you to pray this poem/prayer which is provided in our Lenten resource and which we used on Ash Wednesday. You may notice the allusion to Isaiah 58:1-12, which we read during several services in February, as a touchstone for our journey towards Lent.

New Books in the Library....

<u>The Galapagos Islands: A Spiritual Journey</u> by Brian D. McLaren "Take a spiritual pilgrimage to one of the world's most fragile ecosystems, the birthplace of Darwin's world-shaping theory. McLaren reflects on how his faith has evolved and how the natural world awakens his soul." This is an entertaining read for those interested in what it's like to travel to these famous islands and to learn more about Darwin's faith journey and why his theory of natural selection may be better described as "survival of the best-adapted" rather than "survival of the fittest (most ruthless)."

Healing After Loss by Martha Hickman.

Martha Hickman first published her book in 1994 several years after the accidental death of her 16-year-old daughter. It continues to be a popularly recommended book for those who are working through grief. Martha Hickman writes in the introduction, "Hundreds of people whose words--in chance conversation, in letters, or through the printed page--form the flashpoints for these meditations." The writing is simple and profound, practical and compassionate and speaks to any loss the reader might be experiencing.

Taking your blood pressure at home

High blood pressure, as we know, can lead to adverse health conditions such as heart attacks and strokes. There are multiple medications which can help to lower blood pressure to a normal range and decrease the possibility of one of these health emergencies.

Taking blood pressure readings in a healthcare setting is routine; but sometimes an erroneous high reading can be caused by "white coat syndrome," when people experience anxiety in the office setting. People are often asked to purchase a blood pressure monitor and check their own pressure at home on a regular basis.

There are blood pressure cuffs which fit around the wrist and

others which fit around the upper arm. The upper arm cuffs are generally considered more reliable. Check the manual for your machine for specific instructions for that machine.



Monitoring your blood pressure involves three easy steps:

- Do not exercise, smoke, eat a large meal, take cold medi-1. cine or drink caffeine for at least 30 minutes before taking your blood pressure. If you are taking blood pressure medication, take it after measuring your blood pressure.
- Sit with your back straight, feet flat, and legs uncrossed. 2. Place the cuff snugly on your bare skin directly above the elbow bend or on the wrist, depending on which type of cuff you have. Place your arm, palm facing up, on a table or other surface which is at heart level.
- 3. Press the start button. Stay still and relax until the machine is finished. Then record your numbers in a tracking log.

Take your blood pressure about the same time each morning and evening, and share your readings with your doctor at your next appointment.

Smyrna UCC Technology Committee Report February 21, 2023

Installation and implementation of our new technology is proceeding! A number of us have gathered on several Saturdays. Paul Ashton has unpacked all the new equipment Tom Pfaendler delivered for us, several weeks ago, and has been working on the setup in the back corner of the church. Adam Maurer has twice donned protective gear and ventured into the attic, to install the cables to the new speakers, now mounted on the side walls, and all ready to be hooked into the new sound board. This coming Saturday (Feb. 25), he plans to again make the journey above, to install our new video cameras. We will have two cameras, mounted high on the back wall of the church, on either side of the door.

Once all of this is in place, the sound will come only through the microphones and will be separate from the video. This will be a huge improvement: At present, our single camera (which is essentially a camcorder) is the only source of sound for our videos, and there is no way to limit or adjust what it picks up... So yes, we hear whatever goes through the microphones and old speaker system, but we also get the footsteps, conversations, kitchen noises, etc., and all of that can be heard on the video recording!! Also, once our new equipment is installed and online, Paul will be able to fully monitor and control the volume and sensitivity of the microphones, improving the sound quality for those of who are present in church. For those watching later at home, our two cameras well also adjust remotely, allowing the operator to guickly and accurately shift focus of the video feed to various places in the sanctuary, such as the pulpit, the Communion table, the piano, the organ, the choir area, etc. Not only will this greatly improve the quality of our worship videos on YouTube, it will also give us the option to livestream, in the future.
