BEHOLD!! SMYRNA June 2023 OF CHRIST

Blessed be the tie that binds our hearts in Christian love; The sharing of a common life is like to that above.

Change is hard. Scientists have taught us that even *good* change is stressful for our bodies. And we all cope with change in different ways. Some of us try to avoid thinking about it until the last possible minute. Others of us worry obsessively over it. Others still may "act out" our feelings about impending change unconsciously, letting it come out sideways, so to speak. We all experience loss differently also. I learned long ago that I tend to feel "anticipatory grief" over impending loss—I feel my feelings more before the loss occurs than afterwards (if I know it's coming), though that applies more to life changes than to loss of a loved one. How do you process change and loss?

Pastoral transitions are a significant form of change and loss in the life of a congregation. Even when a pastor hasn't been in the church for a long time, as with an interim pastor, pastoral departures feel disruptive. Interim pastors are a "special breed" in the sense that we come to you knowing that we will leave within a short time, and you accept us into your life knowing we are "temporary shepherds," as one book on interim ministry puts it. Regardless of how long or short a pastor's tenure is, though, it's human nature to get attached. In fact, it's healthy! We all need to bond to some degree for good ministry to get done. I know that in my short time with you—just 15 months and counting—I have bonded with many of you. I have come to know you, to feel affection towards you, to love you as your pastor. And I have come to treasure the unique spirit of kindness, compassion, mutual service, open-heartedness, and sincere inclusiveness that I have found here. So I am starting to feel my own sadness at the prospect of saying goodbye to you, of wrapping up my ministry with you. And yet, I know that we—pastors and congregation together—have done the interim work faithfully, and the time has come to conclude the interim period.

So the date has been set and the preparations are underway. Pastor Cat's and my final Sunday with you as your intentional interim pastors will be June 25th (though Pastor Cat will continue with you a while longer in a different pastoral role—see below). In worship that day, we will have a liturgy of farewell to mark the end of the formal interim period. Yes, it's true, your search committee is still searching, so we can't quite wrap everything up with a bow and call it done. You will need pastoral presence and support to see you through the remainder of the search and call process until your new settled pastor arrives.

And on that subject, there's good news! As you may have already heard, Pastor Cat has felt called to postpone her move to New England for a few more months and to transition from being one of your interim pastors to being your *bridge pastor*. This is a kind of supply pastor that is specifically for the purpose of *bridging* between the departure of the interim pastor(s) and the arrival of

the settled pastor. She and Council leaders working out a new contract for her, with a new understanding of her role. This will enable her to serve among you as your pastor for a little while longer and provide that reassuring pastoral presence that Pastor Cat has been able to offer so beautifully in her work with you. So while I will be ending my ministry with you on June 25, Pastor Cat will be staying on as your bridge pastor for a few more months.



All that is left to say is that I will miss you, and I will always cherish the memories I have of my relationships with you and our ministry together. I am setting aside time in my calendar during June for conversations, zoom calls, coffee dates, visits and other ways for us to say a "good farewell" to one another, for those of you who would appreciate that. It helps to say goodbye well, and it lays the groundwork for a good "hello and welcome" when your new pastor arrives. If you'd like to find time to meet up with me online or in person in June, please contact me by email or phone and we'll set up a time.

In the meantime, let's have a good month together! And let's remember that we never lose those we have loved in Christ. As the beloved hymn goes: "When we are called to part it gives us inward pain, but we shall still be joined in heart, and hope to meet again."

Reversing cognitive decline after retirement

Research has shown that word recall and memory decline after people retire, in countries with generous welfare and pension benefits as well as countries without them. Postponing retirement can protect against cognitive decline, but few of us want to work until we drop (even if we drop with a well-functioning brain). Here are some ways to help stay mentally sharp after retirement:

1. Stay socially connected, with family, old friends, new friends, or casual

- acquaintances. Loneliness is said to be as great a health risk as smoking a dozen cigarettes every day.
- Keep active. An exercise routine is helpful at any age. Aim for at least 150 minutes of moderate-intensity activity or 75 minutes of vigorous activity per week.
- 8. Keep stress to a minimum. Easier said than done, you may say. While you cannot always avoid stressful life events, try not to introduce any new stressors into your life. Get enough sleep. Manage your finances so that you live within your means. Practice meditation or prayer as part of your daily routine. Seek solace from others when you need it.
- 4. Keep working. This does not mean continuing your full-time job, but consider working part time or volunteering as a way to keep connected to others and contribute to the greater good of society.
