As the year rolls along, we are celebrating more "firsts" with one another. Our first Ash Wednesday service on Valentine's Day was a simple and gentle reminder of our mortality. Several of those who attended offered thanks for or reflections about what had come up for them during our short time together.

I think one of the reasons Ash Wednesday can be so moving is that it is one of our only Christian celebrations that involve touch. As a cross was drawn on each forehead, I thought how seldom we touch one another with the pure intention of offering blessing, and also how powerful that is.

Our conference minister Rev. Tyler Connelly calls the era since pandemic lockdown not post-Covid but Covidinformed. In these Covid-informed days we can feel squeamish about getting close enough to touch, and for good reason. Continuing to maintain precautions will help us all stay healthy in the long term. And yet, even in these Covid-informed days, safe and consensual touch is a powerful reminder of the gifts of our humanity, as well as the spark of divinity that burns within each of us.

In fact, reminding ourselves of where humanity brushes up against divinity is why we are noticing all of our senses in this Lenten season. We have many opportunities to dull our senses every moment of every day. But keeping our senses sharp by being aware of them as we experience the world, helps us draw closer and ever closer to God.

I look forward to hearing how your Lent experience is going. Do let me know where you are seeing, hearing, touching, tasting, smelling God's presence in the world!

the series Marching from Pain to Possibility: A Film Series on the Journey from Woundedness to Wholeness. This series features a variety of voices.

COVID Recommendations

The current CDC's recommendation is that anyone testing positive for COVID should stay home for at least five days and wear a mask for an additional five days. Oregon, however, has loosened the recommendation to say that anyone who has COVID can go out as long as they have been without fever for 24 hours and their symptoms are improving. In addition, they say that anyone with the virus should wear a mask for 10 days and try to avoid immunocompromised people.



As we all remember, compliance with mask-wearing has been a divisive issue ever since the onset of COVID, with some people wearing masks to protect themselves and others, while other people refused to wear a mask under any circumstances. There are currently some people who become ill and do not wish to be tested so that they do not face any restrictions on their lives and activities.

Oregonians are still being hospitalized and killed by COVID (as are others across the world). In January there were about 250 Oregonians hospitalized on any given day and about 60 Oregonians died during the month. While that is a small fraction of the statistics at the height of the pandemic, it is still significant, especially if you or one of your loved ones are among the group affected.

So remember the current Oregon guidelines:

- If you get COVID, stay home until you have been without fever for 24 hours and your symptoms are improving.
- Wear a mask for 10 days.
- Try to avoid immunocompromised people (and remember that you never know which people you meet are immunocompromised).

Above all, try to be a good citizen and avoid spreading potentially life-threatening diseases
