Dear Smyrna Folks,

The season between Easter (March 31) and Pentecost (May 19) is called Eastertide. During that season this year, we'll be exploring Resurrection Living. In the northern midwest where I grew up, this time of year was really still winter, with freezing temperatures and snow still falling regularly. Flowers in my hometown didn't start blooming until June, with the appearance of the first lilacs. Here in beautiful Oregon, resurrection living is all around us as the world springs into flower. How do we reflect the resurrection promise of the natural world, by living as God's resurrection people? We'll explore this in a number of ways in the coming months.

On April 14, Joel will share with us the living history of our own Smyrna congregation. Guest speakers after worship on April 21 and April 28 will open our hearts and minds with first person perspectives on Gazan genocide in the middle east. The exploration will reach beyond Sunday. On Tuesday afternoons beginning April 9, we'll meet at 2 PM for an afternoon Coffee (and Prayer) Break, guided by the book *40 Days Journey with Bonhoeffer*. And, looking ahead, we'll be celebrating our mutual ministry as a resurrection people at my installation on Sunday, May 5 at 3 PM.

I'm looking forward to all these ways of exploring with you.

At our gatherings each Tuesday, we'll be discussing insights from the Book 40 Day Journey with Dietrich Bonhoeffer by Ron Klug. You are invited to read a short quote by Bonhoeffer each day, followed by scripture and reflection questions. You do not have to read the book to attend the weekly Coffee (and Prayer) Break, but it will deepen your experience.

Why Dietrich Bonhoeffer? I think he lived in times that, 80



years later, are being reflected in our own day. Like us, Bonhoeffer lived in days of political and economic upheaval leading to the rise of Christian nationalism, causing progressive Christians to question how

they might respond. Born in the early 1900's, Bonhoeffer was a voice of faith and dissidence in his native Germany, when laws oppressing the marginalized and restricting the voices of churches were on the rise. He studied in Berlin and New York City at Union Theological Seminary. While at Union, he was radicalized by the plight of Black Americans under Jim Crow, and bolstered by the friendships he made with activist theologians here in the States. Bonhoeffer left the safety of America to return to Germany and continue his public repudiation of the Nazis, which led to his arrest in 1943 and assassination two years later. I hope you will join me!

How to Save Your Own Life if You're Alone and Having Chest Pain

Here are some tips on what to do.


1. Know the symptoms of a heart attack. They are variable for different people and may feel like aching or pressure or squeezing in the chest. There may also be jaw pain, pain in the arm or shoulder or back, nausea, lightheadedness, and/or shortness of breath.

- 2. Call 911. Don't try to drive yourself to the hospital or have someone else drive you. When the 911 operator answers, tell them you're having chest pain and they will send an ambulance. Then you can call a family member or friend to tell them what's happening. Keep the conversation short.
- 3. Chew an aspirin (one regular 325-mg strength or four baby aspirins of 81-mg strength). This can help reduce clotting in your coronary arteries. Motrin or other pain relievers will not work, so just take the aspirin. If you have some condition that would make aspirin inadvisable, ask the EMTs before taking it.
- 4. If you can, find your list of medication, your ID, and your insurance cards and take them along with you.
- 5. Unlock your front door if you are able.
- 6. Sit down, preferably in a comfortable chair near your front door, and take slow, deep breaths while waiting for the EMTs. Try to stay calm



Smyrna Scholarship Program Established in Memory of Glenda Yoder Sano

Purpose: The Smyrna Scholarship program is designed to provide financial assistance to students who are members of the Smyrna Church family who are or will be enrolled in any accredited college, university, technical, or trade school.


Scholarship Award: Selection of award recipients will be made through a scholarship selection committee chosen by Smyrna Church. The committee will have the responsibility for the amount and number of awards which will be determined from written applications and from personal interviews, if requested.

For students enrolled less than full time, the committee will determine the amount of the scholarship based on the amount of class hours enrolled.

Eligibility Requirements: Applicant must be a current or recently graduated high school senior or in a certified program of continuing education making satisfactory progress. Also, the applicant must be an active participant in Smyrna UCC and a member of the Smyrna UCC family.

Awarding the Scholarship: It is the recipient's responsibility to provide verification of high school graduation or post high school continued education depending on the circumstance. This verification must be from a certified program and must include the registrar's copy of enrolled classes along with their student identification number. The recipient will provide this documentation to the Smyrna UCC treasurer.

The award then will be drafted in the form of a check made out to the recipient's account at the institution, college or university in which you are enrolled. Termination of the student's school program will result in the cancellation of the award.

Two Perspectives on Genocide in Gaza

April 21 - Guest Marcia Gilliland — One Family's Story

Ten years ago I was shopping in Bethlehem. I walked into a small store and the owner and I started talking. His name was Mahmoud and we spent two hours discussing our lives and cultures. We found that we shared many more similarities than differences. We both wanted to contribute to making the world a better place for our children. Several days later I saw him and he invited me to his house for lunch and to meet his wife and children.

The whole family lived in a four story building with parents on the first floor and each brother's family on a different level. Their life was very simple, but they managed. I continued to connect with the family whenever I was in Bethlehem and became "auntie" to the kids.

Since October 6 things have not gone well in Mahmoud's life. There are no tourists to come to his store and so he has no income. He has borrowed money to buy food and medicine. His father has diabetes and could not get his medicine and has lost sight in one eye. The children cannot go to school because it is too dangerous on the streets. As if this weren't enough a month ago an Israeli rocket landed near their house with many injuries and destroyed homes. His children, who were already living in fear, have become even more traumatized, wondering why their strong father cannot protect them.

The politicians continue to discuss a "peace deal" while millions of people, both Israeli and Palestinian, wait for a time when they can have lives free from trauma and fear. This is just one family's story. Consider how many more have been affected and live through this every day.

Marcia Gilliland has been a member of the Central Pacific Conference Palestine Israel Network (PIN) for 10 years. She has been to Palestine/Israel six times working with the Palestine YWCA teaching sewing in a refugee camp near Ramallah and a women's center in Dar Salaam. She has assisted Palestinian farmers in olive picking for two years. She continues to work for equal rights for all people in Israel and Palestine.

April 28 - Guest Rabbi Brian Mayer will be with us during worship to preach from the wisdom gleaned in writing his newest book: *Rabbi Brian's Highly Unorthodox Gospel: A Modern Guide to Compassion, Kindness and Love for Others (and Self)*. Following worship, Rabbi Brian will lead us in the hands-on experience of making matzah, one of the traditional foods of Passover.

Rabbi Brian Zachary Mayer doesn't rabbi normally. Educated at Tufts and Pepperdine, they were ordained by HUC-JIR (Reform Seminary), but then left synagogue life to teach math to inner-city high school students. Concurrently, they founded Religion-Outside-The-Box (ROTB.org)—a worldwide, internet congregation of 1,000's of members seeking spiritualigious provisions without the baggage of mono-dox affiliation. They enjoy writing books, articles, and small bios, making stained glass lamps, and gaining mastery on the French horn. They live in Portland, Oregon and are thinking a lot about pronouns these days. They'll have copies of their books with them, for those who want to purchase a copy to take home.
