Update on Kiva

Kiva, as an organization, stands for a financiallyinclusive world where all people hold the power to improve their lives. Since 2005, Kiva has lent over USD\$1.7B to 4.3 million borrowers in 94 countries. Smyrna has had a team since 2009 and has 17 members who have collectively lent over \$17,000, one small loan at a time. Typically, the loans are for \$25 and go toward small projects in many countries including the U.S. When the loan is paid off, it can be relent. If you would like to join in this worthwhile endeavor, go to Kiva.org and join. Choose Smyrna United Church of Christ as your team. The latest loan from Smyrna's group was May 28, 2024 for \$25 to Ana Cristina in Guatemala who is asking to borrow \$650 for help in her agricultural enterprise to amend the soil for her crops. It is a ten-month loan. Questions? Ask Joel or other members of the team.

What to do if you've fallen and can't get up

About a quarter of older adults take a fall every year. If you fall and have symptoms of a stroke or an injury such as a hip fracture, try to get to the phone any way you can—crawling or rolling if you can't stand up.

If you don't have those kind of symptoms, wait a while to compose yourself. Don't try to stand up unless you're sure you can do it safely, and do it slowly. If you have trouble standing up, try the following techniques:

- Roll onto your side, then into a sitting position on the floor, and get on your hands and knees.
- Crawl toward a piece of sturdy furniture, then turn so that your stronger leg is next to the
- furniture. Place your hands on the furniture for support. If you can, bend the knee closest to the
- furniture and plant that foot on the floor, then push yourself up.
- If you keep your cell phone handy, in a pocket or shoulder holster, you can call for help even if
- you are unable to get up.

If you have a history of falling, it's best to get a medical device, such as a life alert, which can detect falls and call for help if you are unable to. You can generally wear it even in the shower (check the instructions for your particular device). Check with your insurance company to see if the device and the monthly monitoring fee are covered

The Smyrna library has a few health-related books that tell the story of an illness from the viewpoint of the person affected. Here are a few:

<u>Christ on the Psych Ward</u> by David Finnegan-Hosey (manic depression).

Everything Happens for a Reason and Other Lies I've Loved by Kate Bowler (stage IV colon cancer).

<u>Still Alice by Lisa Genova (early-onset Alzheimer's disease).</u>

<u>The Bright Hour, A Memoir of Living and Dying by Nina</u> Riggs (breast cancer).

These books are valuable in understanding the human impact of medical problems, which is quite different from knowing the medical facts, and possibly learning something of how to respond to people undergoing the problems.

The Bright Hour is the story of a 37-year-old poet, wife

and mother of two young sons, who discovers that she has breast cancer. Within a year she loses her mother to multiple myeloma and learns that her own cancer is terminal. Her story, filled with humor and sadness, is of her journey with her family and friends through the medical treat-



ments and everyday life events. She teaches her youngest son to ride a bicycle, she and her family scatter her mother's ashes, she and a friend (who also has cancer) joke about developing a line of snarky greeting cards to respond to the unhelpful and/or thoughtless comments they get about their cancer, and above all she fills her life with love. Read the book for a unique perspective on life and approaching its end.

Audrey (Amaya) Yoder Sept. 10, 1958 – Apríl 27, 2024

Audrey was born in Delano, California on September 10, 1958. Her family moved to Hawthorne, California in 1959 where her father started work at North

American Aviation where he worked on aircraft design and the Apollo program. This is when Audrey first learned a love of star gazing.

As a child in Hawthorne, she walked to school every day with her sister Loretta through grade six. In her free time, she enjoyed riding bikes around the neighborhood, also with Loretta. In

her early grade school years, she became interested in art and took a painting class. Throughout her life she expressed her creativity through drawing, painting, crafting, cake decorating, flower gardening, and crocheting.

In 1970 she moved with her family to Oregon and attended Silverton schools for grades seven through ten.

In 1974 her family moved from Silverton to Marquam where Audrey finished high school at Molalla and met her husband, Paul.

After graduating from Molalla High School in 1976, Audrey started work for the State of Oregon at the Public Utility Commission. In 1979 Audrey and Paul were married at Smyrna UCC. Their first child, Laura, was born in 1985, their second child, Ryan, was born in 1987, and Audrey had a few years of being a full-time mother.

Then in 1990 Audrey, Paul, Laura, and Ryan moved to the Yoder Store, where she lived and worked. As co-owner of the store Audrey worked full time behind the counter, while at the same time raising two children and keeping house. Over the course of the 34 years at the store she developed friendships with many of the regulars. Her favorite customers were the younger ones and she would spend as much time on a .10 sale as a \$50 sale.

Time away from the store was commonly spent camping on long weekends like Labor Day and Memorial Day. She also was able to take a week-long vacation most years by calling on family, friends, and neighbors to watch the store. In later years, she would sometimes leave Paul alone to travel with family.


Audrey was an active member of Smyrna UCC for 45 years, where she enjoyed teaching Sunday School, teaching craft projects, and helping to organize Christmas pageants.

In February of 2023, Audrey was diagnosed with multiple sclerosis. She didn't want to let that change her routine and found ways to adapt to her leg weakness. In November of 2023 she got a diagnosis of multiple myeloma which she didn't want to tell people about because it might make them worry. In the week before her death, she told Paul "Maybe I should



stop driving soon. Sometimes I need to use my hands to lift my leg off the gas and onto the brake." Although she was battling serious diseases, her passing was sudden and unexpected.

Audrey is survived by her husband, Paul Yoder, her father, Philip Amaya (Linda), her mother, Elsie Stadeli (Otto), her daughter Laura Yoder (Chad), her son Ryan Yoder (Romaric), her sister Loretta McCool (Randy), her brother Philip Amaya (Lisa) and her sister Elsa Hominda (Rod). **Donations in Audrey's memory may be made to the** Glenda Yoder Sano Scholarship Fund of Smyrna..



EarthCare Update:

We are several weeks away from the 3rd anniversary of the installation of the solar panels at the church. The system is functioning as planned and we have achieved advantages for the church aside from the main one of helping to mitigate the effects of climate change. Over the life of our project, we have saved 76,224 pounds of CO2 emissions, the equivalent of 576 trees planted. The system was sized to produce power about equal to our usage requirements, and our bill stays constant at about \$20 per month in fixed charges such as the extra meter we need. We save and bank extra kilowatts in the summer and draw on them in the winter. Since the project went on line three years ago in June, we have generated power worth \$6,316.99. Even Tuesday, May 22, when it was full clouds with rain, we generated 26.9 kWh worth about \$3.50 compared to 85 kWh at \$11.05 on a May day with full sun.

The oak tree plantation is leafing out and doing well. We are watching out for briars and discouraging other unwanted weeds by allowing the native grasses to grow.
