#### The Problem With Plastic

We have all seen and heard of the massive plastic pollution of the earth: piling up in landfills, along the roadways, on the beaches, filling the stomachs of sea creatures, floating plastic islands in the oceans. What we may not have realized is that plastic particles are invading our bodies as well. One way is that the chemicals in plastics can leach out and interfere with hormones or other parts of the endocrine system. Also, tiny plastic particles are entering the human body through the air we breathe and the food and water we consume (and possibly other ways as well), and can be found almost everywhere inside the body; and they increase our risk of heart attack, stroke, and death.

A common health problem is atherosclerosis, a buildup of plaque in arteries which reduces blood flow to vital organs. The plaques typically include a mix of cholesterol, fatty substances, waste from cells, calcium, and a blood clotting protein called fibrin. Now scientists have found tiny plastic particles within these plaques, and have discovered that people with plaque containing plastic particles are more than four times as likely to have a heart attack or stroke or die from

any other cause over the next three years. Future research will probably investigate which bodily organs are being damaged by plastic and how the damage is occurring. It is impossible now to avoid exposure to plastics; but there are ways to reduce exposure, including:

- drinking out of steel or glass cups or bottles instead of plastic ones, avoiding plastic straws
- not microwaving food in plastic containers (since heat speeds up the breakdown of plastics)
- and not using plastic bags at stores.

While we can all help to decrease plastic usage, it will require the scientific and healthcare and political communities to make a meaningful change. The United Nations has been working since 2022 toward the world's first-ever plastics pollution treaty and is hoping to finalize a treaty. In the here and now, drink your water from the tap rather than a single-use plastic bottle, throw away your plastic straws, try not to use plastic food containers, use reusable bags at the grocery store, and try any other method you can think of to minimize exposure to plastics. Your body will thank you.

#### **Becoming an Age Friendly Congregation**

One thing everyone reading this holds in common is that we are all older than we were yesterday! Ideas about aging continue to evolve as people live longer. Science is trying to catch up to that reality. There is no significant research in the last century of people over 65, because there just weren't that many people in that age group! But recent research indicates that most people are happier after 40 and happiness peaks well into the 70s. As churches, we often fall prey to culture's ideas about older folks, and can dismiss elders' gifts. At Smyrna, we want to avoid that trap and embrace the age of Active Wisdom. On Sunday, August 25, a couple dozen folks, facilitated by



Joshua Barbur and Pastor Jennifer, gathered after worship to talk about how we can be a more Age Friendly Congregation. Here are some of the ideas that came to the forefront:

- -Some of the conversation centered on shifting capacity that happens for all of us as we age. We wondered how to prepare for a diminishment of independence without a loss of community (and without worrying our kids!).
- \*Some of us feel that one way to deal with diminished independence and function is to accept and let go. For others of us, moving ahead and embracing new technology is a path. Maybe for many of us, the path lies somewhere in between!
- \*Let's have some conversation about when and how to know when to stop or reduce driving, especially for those of us who live in rural areas.
- \*We'd like to learn more memory retention techniques.
- \*We'd like more learning about world events, especially from people's personal experience.
- \*How about a book study on aging? One suggestion is *How We Love is How We Die by Buddhist nun Pema Chodron.*

Many older people feel isolated. How to keep connected? It helps to have a purpose, make a difference and work together as a group. We need a creative, cultural shift in our thinking about aging. Some ideas:

- \*Memory Cafe is back by popular demand. First meeting, October 3 at 12 noon.
- \*Lines for Life Senior Loneliness Line offers a compassionate listening friend for elders in Oregon. Call 503-200-1633.
- \*Could we set up an in-church "adoption" program where younger church members adopt elders?

Interested in meeting in a small group for more conversation on the Age of Active Wisdom, following up on some of these ideas, and making plans for 2024-2025 Memory Cafe season? Let Pastor Jennifer know!
